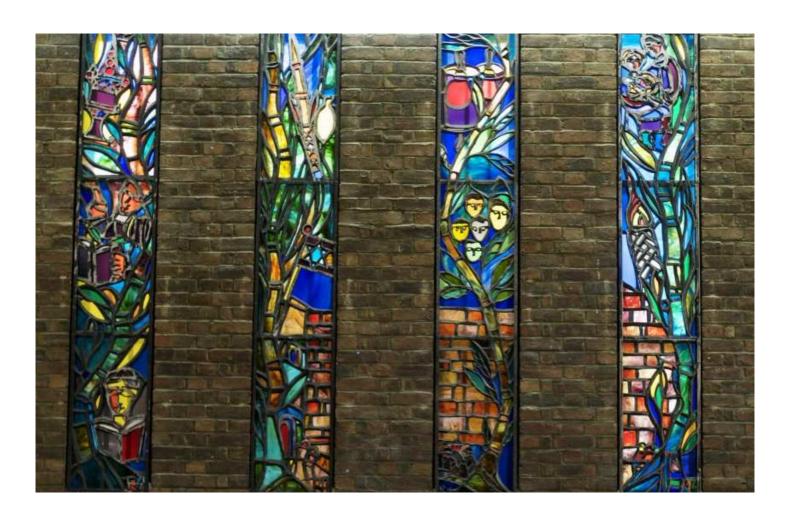

Chairman's Report

We welcome each and every person who comes to Alyth for prayer, music, education, social activities, meetings and events. We also welcome many visitors to Alyth and ensure that they too enjoy our hospitality and warmth.

In January 2014 Cantor Cheryl joined the Clergy Team and Cindy Summers joined us as head of our Kindergarten. Our Clergy team is an integral part of all that we do at Alyth. Their focus on the work that they do and on ensuring members are welcomed, listened to and supported, is inspiring. Our professional and staff teams continue to support the work that is being done. We have a council of young and dynamic lay-leaders and with the launch of the refreshed rebranding, Alyth can continue to show the world it's modern forward looking face.

As President I have tried and hopefully added, to the friendly, welcoming, caring atmosphere of Alyth. I have been very proud to hold the post and to watch the community grow. I have been given so much love and respect it has been very humbling for me. So, though I might be retiring, I know that in your new President, Peter Backman, the role is in very safe hands.

Pray with us

In 2014 we continued the programme of development of our Shabbat Services as we seek to respond to the diverse needs of the Alyth community.

Our **Erev Shabbat service** is now one of the most well-attended and inspiring services in UK synagogue life. Over the year we continued to develop the service, thinking about how to use different chair layouts, and the role of our Children's Choir and Youth Singers, alongside the clergy team.

On Shabbat morning, our **classical service**, as every year, hosted B'nei Mitzvah, pre-wedding blessings, birthdays and anniversaries, as well as supporting those experiencing a bereavement and marking a Yarzheit. It continues to offer a high-quality service, with accompaniment from our wonderful volunteer choir, and sermons from our clergy and guest preachers.

Kollot has continued to become embedded in the life of the community, and is now the primary prayer space for a large number of our members, who also have the opportunity to read Torah and deliver a Dvar Torah. We are grateful to Justin Wise, who regularly leads the service with the clergy, and to John and Peter for their role as shamashim. Gratitude, too, to the **Big Bang** musicians, who continue to inspire and entertain in this very special monthly service.

Innovation in tefillah remains one of Alyth's greatest features. In 2014, our **Tefillah Lab** included Shira u'Shtikah, Terrifying Tefillah, Supertots, Healing services and a Cheshbon HaNefesh service for Ellul. 2014 also saw the first of our Third Space services for Young Adults, run in conjunction with FRS

Finally, a word for our wonderful, lay-led **Sunday Shacharit** service, which meets every Sunday for tefillah, followed by bagels and warm company.

Our services do not run with clergy alone. We are grateful for the support of all who help to make our services work, and especially our choir, lay-readers and wardens . In 2014 the warden team expanded into a much larger group, trained and supported by Michael, Nicola and Selina, who have our gratitude for all their efforts.

Learn with us

We believe that Jewish learning is central to a meaningful Jewish life. We aim to create opportunities for study that are intellectually rich, grounded in Jewish tradition and inspiring for all – both accessible, grown-up Jewish learning, and learning that nurtures and challenges our young people.



Jewish learning is at the heart of communal Alyth life every year, and 2014 was no different.

Our regular learning programmes continued to offer accessible, intellectually challenging learning for our diverse congregation - those coming new to Judaism, those for whom learning is central to their lives, and for those going through the life-cycle . These include our weekly **Gateway** and **Talmud** classes, special **Ruach Parents sessions** parallel with our Bar/Bat Mitzvah programme, our **Marriage course** and **Rosh Chodesh** group.

Other highlights of the year included:

Shabbat Shiurim: 25 different shiurim before the Shabbat morning service over the year, including text study on Midrash, Bible and Talmud; theological discussion; sessions on subjects as diverse as Women in Judaism and Christianity; the Orthodox liturgy and Ours; Jews of the Caribbean; and Jewish Chaplains in the German Army in WW1.



Learning for the Jewish Calendar: Special community learning programmes for Ellul and the High Holy Days, and Preparing for Pesach.

One-off learning sessions including: high-level Jewish study (such as an evening on Rabbi Ishmael's 13 Hermeneutical Principles and What is the Talmud and why does it matter?), Israel based learning, Interfaith learning, sessions on Jewish ethics and more.

Trips to the National Gallery and British Museum

A wonderful **Scholar-in-Residence** programme, in which we welcomed one of the world's foremost scholars, the Jewish feminist theologian Rabbi Professor Rachel Adler.

Learn with us - Youth & Education

Galim is the Education and Youth Department of the synagogue.

Galim provides a learning and Jewish engagement programmes for ages 4 – 18, led by a dedicated and ambitious team of educators.

Together we celebrate the festivals with art and crafts, singing, storytelling and other activities.

Our desire is for our children to love coming to learn at Alyth and for them to benefit from the knowledge and skills they acquire and to inspire a journey of learning and living for each of them.



Kef Zone is our Wednesday Club that was developed in September 2014. It acts as an umbrella brand for clubs run by the Galim department, Upbeat Drama run by Jane Gordon, Children's Choir run by Cantor Cheryl and Alyth's Children's Theatre.

For every festival, the department ran a **Festival Tea** for under 7s and their families to celebrate, come together and partake in festival themed activities. The teas last an hour and are usually very well attended with a range of 10-15 families.

Spring Days ran during the Pesach holidays for 34 children in Reception—Year 5. The week consists of Pesach themed activities designed, created and led by madrichim who are trained in house at Alyth as well as opt in activities including football, drama, designing your own puppet show, circus skills, story telling, Pesach games and singing songs.



Summer Days runs the week before Summer Madness and helps create the most thriving month of the year for the department. The activities and the layout of the week is run in a very similar manner to Spring Days to create the 'Days package' including similar activities and including original madrichim led programmes.

Sukkot Sleepout along with Summer Madness is one of the long standing events in Alyth youth's history. Sukkot Sleepout provides children with the opportunity to experience and empathise with the homeless and what it is like to sleep outside while raising money for Homeless Action in Barnet.

Summer Madness is the highlight of the department's summer. It has been running for 23 years and is always a popular residential trip. With chanichim and madrichim combined, approximately 50 young Alyth members attend Summer Madness and spend 5 days together in Northampton in August. During the week we partake in many activities including: site led activities and peulot that madrichim have written and planned, drama, arts and crafts, raft building, wide games, movie nights and much more.



Ruach residentials are an integral part of the B'nei Mitzvah process. The main aim of these residentials is social bonding and as you can see from the numbers, they are always well attended and very successful. With thanks to JJBS whose grant made it possible.

Year 6: 28 attendees in March

Year 7: 33 attendees in November

Year 8: 20 attendees in October (international)

The **Hadracha Course** runs in Year 9 and 10 – 5 sessions in year 9 and 10 sessions in year 10. In 2014 there were 9 participants on the Year 10 course and 13 on the Year 9 course. The department is developing an advanced hadracha course for those in Year 12 and 13.



Sunday Morning Galim is a nourishing space for young people to build, develop and explore their Jewish identity. Learning is achieved through dynamic, multi-sensory classroom experiences where both the building of knowledge and a solid peer group are equally valued.

There are 134 students enrolled on this provision ranging from 4-12 years of age. The programme is staffed by 6 teachers with David-Yehuda Stern. Teachers are supported by a team of approximately 25 trained madrichim. Attendance has been strong throughout the year and we have seen increased parent engagement thanks in part to initiatives such as the re-launched Galim Parents Group.

This year students have explored a range of topics and in doing so engaged in many unique experiences including: building their own Chanukiah, Mezuzah and Tallitot making and taking



part in professional-led Israeli dance classes. In addition to our regular Jewish Studies and Hebrew sessions, students have also enjoyed some great festival themed mornings, and we regularly have members of the Clergy come in and run assemblies for the students.

We require all staff to hold a valid DBS and to attend regular training programmes during the course of the year. They receive regular feedback and are supported by the professional Galim Team. For the second year running we brought in a group of professional educators from our community to observe, support and provide feedback to each of our teachers. This space provides staff the opportunity to discuss successes and challenges with an experienced education professional and for us to observe and develop best class practice

There are approximately 82 members enrolled on the **Ruach**, our Bar & Bat Mitzvah programme. The programme is staffed by David-Yehuda Stern, Alice Goldsmith and Sophie Langsford with support from 6 trained madrichim and 20 B'nei Mitzvah mentors.



The topics covered on a Friday evening are Social Justice and Ethics, Prayer and Shabbat and The Jewish Journey . Our sessions have been joined by guest educators such as Ben Salamon (Tzedek's Education Programme Coordinator) and Dalia Lyons from the Artisan Tallit Co.

We continue to run Ruach Parents Sessions, which are led by the Clergy and are aimed at parents whose children attend the Friday night programme. The sessions are designed to help support and build parent's Jewish knowledge and confidence during the B'nei Mitzvah experience.

We currently have very strong attendance at the Friday Night Service from both students and parents. Approximately 85% of students attending the Friday evening programme attend the service each week.

Learn with us - Early Years

Alyth Kindergarten



Under the leadership of Cindy Summer, the Alyth Kindergarten is now very much part of the synagogue community and works far more closely with the clergy and the Galim team. The creation of Supertots, held once a term, strengthens ties with the community and is led by Rabbi Mark, Tor Alter and Cindy Summer.

Keeping parents involved in the learning of their children is very important to us and we do this by having a Parent Forum which meets once per half-term and a weekly newsletter which is presented in a new style along with a personal email written by Cindy. This has resulted in happy parents and Cindy's 'open door' policy has increased the positive relationships with parents.



We have taken on two work placement students with special needs. This tangible inclusion is very important for both staff and also for the children to see.

The structures of the Kindergarten have also changed. The school year has been increased from 34 to 36 weeks, more in line with other schools. A new teaching structure empowers the Teacher Team Leader to take full control and responsibility for their children, their parents and the classroom. Long Days lessons are now themed, with a Teacher Team Leader, making the programme more attractive. This has resulted in numbers of attendees increasing to 36. More flexible afternoon sessions mean parents can choose from 1 to 3 days (non-consecutive).

Shofar Daycare Nursery

Over the past year we have been involved in the creation of a dynamic, new, Jewish Daycare Nursery for babies and children aged six months to five years old in Finchley.

Shofar is an inspiring collaboration between Alyth and Finchley Reform Synagogue (FRS). The aim is to build a daycare nursery that provides families with the highest quality daycare in a creative, caring, stimulating, Reform Jewish environment.

The new, purpose designed space at the Sternberg Center in N3 will be filled with fantastic activities and resources to allow children to grow and develop both indoors and out.

Shofar is due to open in late Autumn 2015.



Be with us - Synagogue Groups

We believe that nothing is more important in the life of a Jewish community than the relationships that we build and the welcome that we can give to one another.

Prayer and learning are a central part of Jewish life, but they are not enough. To be a community is to share a wider range of interests and activities with one another – to be a genuine Jewish community centre.

There are many groups and clubs that meet regularly at Alyth (and sometimes outside):



Thursday afternoon **Bridge** is flourishing. We have a core of regular attendees who come with a smile whatever the weather! Our players are able to come without a prior commitment or a partner. As a by product of these afternoons, organised by Sheila and Michael Angel we have raised nearly £8,000 for synagogue funds.

The **Cycling Community**, organised by Laurence Mendoza, continues to provide friendship and exercise for Alyth members spanning our community in age and ability with their monthly rides (and more regular rides in the summer).

Our new **Coffee House Poetry** group of 20 members meets every other month to share and discuss poetry.



The **Alyth Ramblers** have been on six day rambles in the Chilterns and Hertfordshire area throughout the year. They have also rambled for longer periods at their weekend away in Shropshire in July and a week in Israel in the Galilee in May.

The Alyth **Senior Club**, organised by a team of volunteers, is our 60s plus club for members of the synagogue or parents of synagogue members with approximately 25-30 members attending the Monday afternoon meetings. The programme (speakers, music, current affairs discussion, quizzes etc.) starts at 14:00 and lasts for just under an hour, followed by an excellent tea prepared by Synagogue members. Several outings are organised every year. In July the club visited the Green Dragon Pub in London Colney for a Pub Lunch; in August Afternoon Tea was enjoyed at the West Lodge Park Hotel and in March this year the club attended a musical show at the Wyllyotts Theatre in Potters Bar.



Mothers, fathers, grandparents, carers and toddlers have enjoyed playing with toys and having a sing-a-long on Monday mornings at our **Toddler Group**.

Alyth is now offering five **Yoga** classes a week; three general classes, one pregnancy class and one mellow yoga class, all taught by experienced yoga teacher Maxine Levy. Rabbi Mark and Maxine have created **Kavannah Yoga** to explore fresh ways of cultivating a personal spiritual practice. Rabbi Mark reads from selected Jewish texts and Maxine interweaves this with traditional yoga postures, movement, breathing and meditation techniques. These sessions have been run at Alyth, JW3 and at Limmud. Yoga has also been added to the Sunday Morning Galim curriculum to help explore Shabbat morning prayer.

Be with us - Tekiyah Fundraising Events



As part of the Alyth 80 celebrations the **Alyth 80 Comedy Night,** compered by Bennett Arron, featured comedians Lee Nelson, Mark Maier and Francine Lewis. 150 attended a hilarious evening raising £1,000.



The **Alyth 80 Cookbook Launch** gave members a chance to see 'A Life in Food', our cookbook. The launch included a chocolate demonstration by celebrity chef and chocolatier David Mendes and grand birthday bake off. Guests were treated to a supper of dishes cooked from recipes included in the cookbook. Competitors were asked to bake an Alyth birthday cake and guests were able to sample all the entries. The overall winner was Valentina Vukadonovic. Cookbooks are still available for purchasing.

Our **Annual Quiz Supper** was held in November. This popular event attracted 254 guests who enjoyed a fish and chip supper and seven hilarious rounds of questions. The event included an auction and a raffle which raised $\mathfrak{L}9,000$.

Be with us - Music and Drama

Music and drama is at the heart of Alyth. Ours is a community that sings together with the music of our diverse services, and the joyful singing of young and old. Under the guidance of our Director of Music of over 30 years, Viv Bellos MBE, Alyth has become famous throughout the world for our adult and youth choirs, and is known as a place in which all are encouraged to sing. This love of music and singing infuses every aspect of communal life.



Our **Synagogue Choir** has 16 dedicated members which expands to 28 for the High Holy Days. The choir brings music and song to all Shabbat morning classical and festival services

Our **Singing for Pleasure** choir consists of 30 members who regularly rehearse together and delight the residents of the many homes that they sing at through out the year..



The **Alyth Choral Society** gives three concerts a year, including one with professional orchestra & soloists. Its vibrant music director, Robin Osterley, together with its energetic chorus master, Viv Bellos MBE, work wonderfully together to create a varied and exciting programme which encompasses an extensive repertoire. The choir had a wonderful bonding trip in Paris where they visited the Rue Copernic Synagogue, and established links between the synagogues. An away day workshop at Latimer Place with music director, chorus master and accompanist, Kelvin Thomson, helped to focus the choir on singing techniques which helped the choir to create a marvellous performance of Handel's Esther in December.

The Centre for Jewish Music and the Arts, which is housed at Alyth, put on its annual Jewish Music Fair in April. There were 90 participants attending 27 workshops on all aspects of Jewish Music given by some of the country's leading Jewish musicians. It also put on outings to English Touring Opera performances of Handel's Ottone, Donizetti's Siege of Calais, the National Gallery Making Colour Exhibition, the Knitwear Exhibition at the Fashion Museum

Alyth Youth Singers has 22, 13 – 15 year olds who rehearse once a week and sing once a month in the Erev Shabbat service. They are also invited to sing at other events throughout the year including the Barnet Council Holocaust Memorial Day commemoration, the 70th anniversary of liberation of Auschwitz in Westminster Abbey and this year's trip took them to Dublin.



In addition to the wonderful spirit that their singing brings to a monthly Erev Shabbat services, the **Children's Choir** builds the childrens' confidence, teaches teamwork, and provides a lot of fun whilst learning Jewish music with friends.

2014 saw the resurgence of **Alyth Academy of Performing Arts** with 16, 13 – 15 year olds working on a production of the Musical '13' for performances over the May 2015 Bank Holiday weekend. **Alyth Children's Theatre**, the junior version of Academy, put on a hugely successful production of Oliver in June. Whilst **PACT - Upbeat Theatre**, the preparatory version of ACT, allowed 8, 3 - 7 year olds to take part in an introduction to the disciplines of putting on shows this group give a short performance each term.





Act with us

We believe in a Judaism that is utterly engaged with the world around us, both within the Jewish people and our wider community.

To be Jewish is to care about the world around us and to take responsibility for it. Alyth is home to the social awareness and activism that Judaism demands of us.

From our willingness to have difficult conversations about Israel to our work to support our twin community in Kerch in the Crimea; from our volunteer-led monthly refugee drop-in and winter homeless shelter, to our work to enable those with mental illness to enjoy Jewish life; from our campaigning work for social justice to the extraordinary contributions of our members to life in the wider community – Alyth is a community engaged in the world around us.



For the third year we participated in the **Together in Barnet Night Shelter**, in partnership with Golders Green Parish Church. We were also part of the team that planned and volunteered for the Christmas Shelter which ran for four days from Christmas Eve, working with the team at FRS who hosted the Shelter. Over 30 volunteers from Alyth and Golders Green Parish Church came together to provide a three course home-cooked meal, companionship and conversation, as well as safe, warm overnight accommodation for a group of 16 homeless men and women each week



Over the course of the Together in Barnet Shelter this year, 60 guests used the Shelter; by the end of the Shelter more than 20 guests had been found homes. When they are housed, each guest receives a Starter Pack of basic household goods (such as pots and pans, a toaster and a kettle), which are being funded this year by the generosity of Alyth through the High Holy Days Appeal.



Our **Interfaith** programme continued to grow with our series of conversations with members of St Edward the Confessor Catholic Church. One such discussion was on the controversial topic of Covenant. This was hosted by the Church and we were given a very interesting tour of this historic place. An innovation of the year was to host an Iftar, the name given to the breaking of fast each night during Ramadan. We welcomed 30 members of the Muslim community as the first Synagogue to do this and garnered coverage on press, radio and TV. For our contribution to Interfaith Week we organised on behalf of Barnet Multifaith Forum and Barnet Womens Interfaith Network an evening at the Town hall with Dr Harriet Crabtree, the Director of the Interfaith Network of the UK and other members of the IFN Executive, including Rabbi Maurice.

50 infirm, housebound or unwell members of Alyth were visited by one of a team of more than 20 volunteers who deliver **care packages** at Sukkot and Purim.



6 **Bayit Cham** lunches were held for an average 25 people after the Shabbat morning service, cooked and hosted by a team of volunteers.

The **Kerch Committee** held a fundraiser and screening of the film "The Return". Unfortunately due to the current conflict, no organised official trips have been able to take place but around £20,000 has been sent to our twinned community in Kerch.

Our **Monday Club**, organised by Dennis Sher, had 38 sessions, providing social activities for people with learning difficulties.



6 **Shalom Suppers**, organised by Zvia Klier were held in 2014. Regularly feeding 70 people from JAMI and the Shalom Centre who join us for Shabbat services and for a Shabbat evening meal cooked by a team of volunteers. *With thanks to Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust for their support.*

The **Monthly Drop in for Recent Refugees**, organised by Debbie Rose and Cheryl Brodie, continued to help approximately 40 clients each month. A large group of volunteers from the Alyth community provide a place to meet, to gain help with British bureaucracy, to knit, and to eat and enjoy.

The 2014 **High Holy Days Appeal** raised over £55,000. Thank you to everyone who donated. The selected charities will be coming to Alyth to tell us more about their work over the coming months. The charities we are supporting this year include the Clergy Charitable Fund, Welfare Fund, Alyth Weekend Away Fund, Kerch Jewish Community, Leo Baeck Education Centre, Haifa, Parents Circle-Families Forum, Meketa, The Bike Project, Together in Barnet Night Shelter, Opening Doors with Age Concern. Please go to our website to find out more about these charities.

Alyth is always engaged with Israel but never scared of dealing with Israel's complexities. In 2014 the Synagogue programme included a number of encounters which opened up Israeli society through the eyes of trusted interpreters. Through sermons in our services, open fora, panel discussions and talks at the Synagogue and in members' homes we heard from Rabbi Gilad Kariv (Executive Director of the Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism), Anat Hoffman (Director of the Israel Religious Action Center and leader of Women of the Wall), Rabbi Ofek Meir (Deputy Director of our twin community, the Leo Baeck Center in Haifa) and Lian Najami, an inspiring Israeli Arab student leader. We heard about the strains in Israeli society and work to rectify them from Mercavim, an organisation which works to build Israeli civil society. They brought an Ethiopian Israeli leader, a Charedi leader and a leader of Israeli Arabs to the Synagogue to debate and help us to understand their views of Israel's potential. From our own community Dr Keith Kahn Harris helped us to consider how we speak to each other about Israel, with a talk based on his 2014 book, "Uncivil War". David Janner-Klausner helped consider the end of a generation of heroes in Israeli politics following the death of Ariel Sharon.

Two annual events kept us connected to Israel. We commemorated Yom HaZikaron and celebrated Yom HaAtzmaut. Alongside the dance and party organised by the hardworking Alyth Israel Committee chaired by John Cohen, we also showed powerful films made by the students of the Tel Aviv University Film School and held discussions and an Israel party for our youngest members. Teenage Madrichim from the Leo Baeck Center joined Alyth's youth leaders through the late summer for Summer Madness and Summer Days camps bringing Israel to our Youth Department.

The summer was overshadowed by the Israel – Gaza conflict. Alyth was a safe space to talk about our concerns and learn about the conflict. We held a panel discussion with the leaders BICOM, Yachad and the Movement for Reform Judaism and also open fora before our Shabbat evening services so that members could share their concerns with our Clergy.

Intelligent, deep and thoughtful engagement with Israel remained the hallmark of Alyth's Israel work.

Live with us

Alyth is built on a foundation of mutual care in which we share one another's joys and sorrows and accompany one another through our life journeys.

One of the greatest joys of Jewish life is to live as part of a caring community – one that supports us when we are falling, and shares our joys in happy times.

Alyth is a place of care: led by a dedicated Director of Welfare and Life Cycle, ours is a community in which we care for one another through illness, bereavement, and the many challenges of life – providing practical and emotional support – meals, transport, company, and a listening ear for those who need. To care is built into the fabric of everything we do.

The Shul Shuttle made approximately 25 journeys a week to bring members to services and events.

A group of 16 men and women make up our **Chevra Kadisha** - attending and performing tahara (body washing) for the dead prior to burial or cremation.

Six members making up the Bereavement Call Group made regular calls to all those who have been bereaved.

Our new monthly **Shabbat B'Yachad** provided an average of 30 people the opportunity to share the spirit of Shabbat together following the Erev Shabbat Service.

A five part **Marriage Course** for about to be, or newly married couples, with sessions on: The Jewish Home, Putting together a Jewish Wedding Ceremony, Resolving Conflict in your Marriage.

Our new News Views Coffee & Schmooze provided 15 people with a fortnightly space to chat about the news.

Two Young at Heart Days were attended by approximately 25 people who enjoy a day of activities including singing, mellow yoga, films and more.

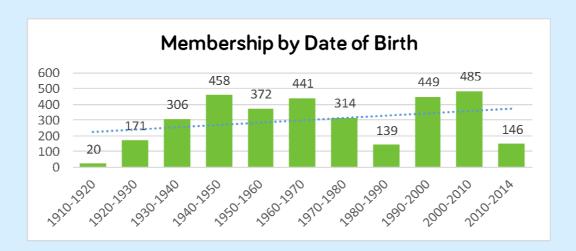

TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

The Trustees present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of North Western Reform Synagogue (the charity) for the year ended 31 December 2014. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The charity is constituted by a Deed of Trust dated 23 February 1966 and is registered with the Charity Commission under charity number 247081. The Deed of Trust has been amended in subsequent years, the latest amendment being in December 2008.

Method of appointment or election of Trustees

Trustees are elected to the Board annually in May for terms of up to three years (renewable) in accordance with the provisions of the Trust Deed.

Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

On joining the Board, new Trustees are provided with an informal training session with an existing Trustee.

Organisational structure and decision making

The charity is adminstered by a Board of unpaid Trustees (Executive Members). The Board is responsible for the overall management and control of the Synagogue and meet at least eleven times a year. The work of implementing most of the policies is carried out by a number of committees who are directly responsible to the Board.

Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and Activities

Policies and objectives

The North Western Reform Synagogue is a constituent of the Movement for Reform Judaism. Reform Judaism, is an informed and questioning, compassionate and egalitarian expression of a unique faith and culture, rooted in the tradition of the Torah, yet in dialogue with modernity.

The North Western Reform Synagogue exists in order to sustain and develop a Jewish centre for its members based on Jewish values and ethics, to meet its members' religious and communal needs, and to contribute to the wider Jewish and non-Jewish communities.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

Strategies for achieving objectives

The Synagogue is committed to the advancement of the Reform Tradition and to playing its part in the development of the Progressive teaching of Judaism as a constantly evolving tradition.

Activities for achieving objectives

Each year the trustees review the objectives and activities to ensure they continue to reflect the aims of North Western Reform Synagogue. In carrying out this review the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

Volunteers

In common with all charities the Synagogue is heavily reliant on the contributions made by a number of volunteers.

Achievements and performance

Review of activities

The principal activities of the charity in the year continued to be that of the provision of religious services, education, welfare and cultural activities.

Investment policy and performance

The Trustees' investment powers are governed by the Trust Deed, which permits the charity's funds to be invested in a wide range of securities and assets.

The Board's investment policy is to aim for capital stability and safe long term growth commensurate with planned spending needs from time to time.

The Trustees will continue to manage the charity's investments in conformity with this policy and the trust deed.

Financial review

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Board of Trustees is responsible for the management of the risks faced by the Synagogue. The task of monitoring the charity's financial control systems and risk management processes is delegated to the Financial Advisory Committee. Risks are identified, assessed and controls established as appropriate. Consequentially the Trustees are satisfied that the major risks identified are mitigated.

Reserves policy

The Trustees' policy with regard to free reserves has been to set a target for such reserves equal to 25% of the projected subscription income (and income tax recoverable) of a typical year. Accordingly the Board sets a budget each year which aims to break-even.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

Asset cover for funds

The notes to the financial statements set out an analysis of the assets attributable to the various funds. The trustees are of the opinion that these assets are sufficient to meet the charity's obligations.

Plans for the future

Future developments

The charity will continue with the provision of religious services, education, welfare and cultural activities for the foreseeable future.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005 and applicable accounting standards.

1.2 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

1.3 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. For legacies, entitlement is the earlier of the charity being notified of an impending distribution or the legacy being received.

Kindergarten fees and education income are deferred as necessary to recognise them over the period to which they relate.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.4 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Costs of generating funds comprises all costs incurred by the charity associated with attracting voluntary income to finance its charitable objectives.

Charitable expenditure comprises all expenditure incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services.

Support costs comprise central costs including salaries, accommodation costs and other expenses related to the running of the synagogue. These costs have been allocated to charitable activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Governance costs comprise all costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity.

1.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Freehold property - 2% straight line
Fixtures & fittings - 15% straight line
Computer equipment - 25% straight line
New Bimah - 4% straight line

1.6 Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.

1.7 Pensions

The charity pays contributions into certain employees' own personal private pension schemes. Contributions into these pension schemes are charged to the statement of financial activities for the year in which they are incurred.

1.8 Taxation

As a charity the synagogue is generally exempt from income tax and capital gains tax but not from VAT. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of those items to which it relates.

Gladys Gebbie fund represents investments of the late Gladys Gebbie and the outgoing amount is used to fund part of the Welfare Officer's salary and expenses.

Jubilee fund relates to a fund set up to provide grants out of capital for major work to the Synagogue and grants out of income to fund education activities. It originally had its own trustees and constitution.

Alyth Youth fund provides grants to the youth department and direct to individuals to assist with specific activities and purchases. It originally had its own trustees and constitution.

During the year the Trustees of the Jubilee fund and Alyth Youth Fund agreed that not enough grants were being made from the funds, in part due to the difficulties of getting the trustees together. Consequently each trustee agreed to combine the funds and retire as trustees. The Trustees of the synagogue have now become trustees of the single fund although the balances will continue to be reported separately for clarity. It is intended that as the Synagogue Trustees meet monthly there will be greater opportunity to assess fund applications and therefore better utilisation of the existing fund balances.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

17. STATEMENT OF FUNDS (continued)

Rabbi's Charitable fund is an account set up by the Rabbi, which is now part of the Synagogues restricted funds. Income is obtained from donations from members and confidential payments are made to members of the Synagogue in extreme financial need at the discretion of the Rabbi and the President who are trustees of this account.

NWRS Charitable fund represents amounts collected by the High Holyday Appeal of the Synagogue and other collections which have been or will be paid to earmarked charities.

The Tekiyah fund represents monies allocated to be spent in the future by the Synagogue in relation to improvements to its buildings.
