Alien Registration Files at the National Archives (US)

On June 03, 2009, JGSGW President Jeff Miller attended a ceremony at the National Archives (NARA) in Washington, D.C. An agreement was signed between NARA and the US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) giving the Alien Registration records a permanent home at NARA. This is Jeff's report:



I attended the signing ceremony described in the following press release:

U.S. Congresswoman Jackie Spear, representative from the 12th Congressional District in California was one of the speakers. The original initiative came from the Asian-American Community, particularly from the constituencies in the San Francisco area where many of the records on the Angel Island Immigration Station* are located. The late Congressman Tom Lantos initiated the effort as a result of lobbying from the Asian-American community.

The records involving those born 100 years ago will be transferred from one facility (USCIS) to another (NARA) later this year, in both the San Francisco area and the Kansas City area, as noted in the press release. About 135,000 case files will be transferred at first. This agreement guarantees future permanent survival of an important data set for our immigrant ancestors who were the subject of the relevant Alien Case Files (known as A-files). Those files to be transferred date from 1944, but cover anyone born in the first six to nine months or so of 1909, or earlier.

Auschwitz tattoo numbers photography project

Some of you might have seen me with two badges at the 29th IAJGS Conference. One was the Philly2009 badge and the other one had a photograph of an arm bearing a number. The latter was to promote awareness in a new project. Gabriella Y. Karin, a sculptor and Holocaust survivor (and my aunt), began this project because she realized that there is no visual catalogue that identifies the survivors of Auschwitz.

The blurred lines of a serial number on a forearm are the image of the Holocaust. The tattoos of the survivors symbolize the brutality of the concentration camps. There is no official document that identifies the people who were subjected to having these numbers tattooed on their arms. With this project, we are trying to make a visual documentation of this barbaric happening. If possible, please help us assemble information about as many people as we can reach.

- 1. We need a photograph of the person showing their tattoo
- 2. Photo of the forearm with the number plus a close-up of the number
- 3. Full name (including maiden name if applicable), city and country where the person lives
- 4. The tattoo number written clearly

Databases and Their Uses – A Case Study And A Call For Help

For nearly two decades I have worked to develop databases identifying Holocaust victims and survivors, Jews and non-Jews, and I receive a steady stream of requests for help with regard to locating victim and survivor information. I help where I can, and the following true story (names altered in the interest of privacy) is intended to illustrate how the rather dull "business" of constructing databases impacts on the real world and how you (the reader) can help.

I received an inquiry from Israel. The inquirer, call him Jakob, asked for assistance in determining the name of his birth mother. He was born in 1946 in a Displaced Persons camp in Germany, but was sent as an infant for adoption in Palestine. Up to now he had not sought this information, since he was concerned that doing so would be "disloyal" to the persons who had adopted and raised him. They were now dead and he wanted to know his "roots".

Using International Tracing Service (ITS) and United States Holocaust Memorial Museum (USHMM) databases, with the help of colleagues at the USHMM < http://www.ushmm.org/ >, I was first able to find Jakob's birth certificate, which gave the name of his mother, call her Rachel. No father was listed. Then, in other collections, I found Rachel's account of her own life, where she was born, her parents' names, her deportation, liberation, ultimate emigration a few years later and marriage in her new country of residence. All of this information was sent to Jakob.

Given her birth in 1917, Rachel is probably dead now, but she might well have had children, who could be located. Whether Jakob decides to pursue this possibility is, obviously, solely up to him and all that I did was to



give him guidance how he could search for persons in that country.

This "case," and it is by no means unique, is, for me, more than a nice story with a happy ending. For nearly 20 years, as a volunteer at the USHMM, I have worked with Museum staff, other volunteers here and dozens of JewishGen volunteers in developing databases. The goal was, drawing on contemporary documents, to give names, and more complete identities where possible, to persons who up to then had merely been Holocaust statistics, e.g. so many thousands of persons were murdered at concentration camp X.

Much progress has been made in recent years in collecting and extracting information. For example, the USHMM's Name Search database currently holds 5,923,669 name citations, i.e. persons who have been identified in Holocaust documents. This number is somewhat misleading since it includes maiden names and double entries where a single person is listed with two names. If these are excluded, the number goes down to 5,019,697. In addition, of course, many persons'

names appear more than once in documents and each citation is held separately. Thus, an actual number for individuals included cannot be calculated. This does not include the much larger ITS collection with its estimated 50 million documentary citations and, perhaps, 17 million names - again, Jews and non-Jews, victims and survivors. Both the ITS collection and much of the USHMM database do not appear on the Web due to European privacy restrictions, but all are available in response to inquiries and the 2 million JewishGen Holocaust database, largely based on USHMM holdings, is available at < http://www.jewishgen.org/databases/Holocaust >. In the past year, 85,000 names were added to that database.

Perhaps the most dramatic example of a database which has been completed, and which will shortly be given to JewishGen, is an index to the last hand-written letters from Łódź ghetto residents begging not to be shipped out to what they knew was death. The German language (Germans', Czechs' and Austrians') letters have been indexed and a project to index the Polish language letters will follow. The emotion in these letters is hard to describe, and now, for the first time, these letters can be identified and copied for family members.

The following list of databases which have been recently completed may give the reader an idea of the scope of this effort and there are many more:

- ⇒ Radom prison records
- ⇒ Steyr forced labor
- ⇒ Transfers to Sachsenhausen
- ⇒ Gross Rosen prisoner lists
- ⇒ Deportations from Italy
- ⇒ Lublin ghetto lists

Lists currently being worked on by volunteers or otherwise being processed include concentration camp lists from ITS which, for unknown reasons, were not indexed, several Polish collections as well as a wide variety of material from Rumania. Four other large databases, including an interesting collection of survivor lists published immediately after the end of WWII have been completed here but have not been sent to JewishGen because we cannot locate proofreaders, even though proofreading may be done at home. While the USHMM would prefer local proofreaders, Jewish-Gen faces the same problem and is seeking volunteers around the world. If you believe that this work is important, where are you? Not to mislead you, this is tedious detail work and you must have e-mail and Excel. However, the payoff in the form of personal satisfaction is great. The HAUSNERs From Kojetin, Moravia

I, Tony Hausner, have spent the past 10 years studying my mother's family tree and the town where she was born, Skala Podolskaya, in Eastern Galicia, now in Ukraine. I am the town leader for JewishGen's Skala research group. There is a wonderful Skala web site¹ put together by our web leaders Helene Kenvin and Max Heffler. I got started on this genealogical journey because of interest amongst other family members and because my father provided me with a large tree for this side of the family.

In early October 2008, I looked at my father's family tree and focused on the fact that my paternal great-grandfather, Emanuel HAUSNER, was born in Kojetin, Moravia. Czechoslovakia < http://data.jewishgen.org/wconnect/ wc.dll?jg~jgsys~shtetm~-547424 >. I did a search using the Internet and found another Hausner from the same town, entered by her grandson. I searched the Internet for information on the grandson and found he teaches in Slovakia. I emailed him and after several communications between him, his sister, and me, they sent me a family tree which indicated that my great-grandfather Emanuel had four brothers: Moritz, Herman, Johann, and Jakob. Herman is great-grandfather to these new-found cousins. Also I learned that the

father to these five brothers was Markus (apparently my great-great-grandfather). I have combined my cousin's family tree with mine (see table 1, page 7).

I also discovered a website² for the town of Kojetin put together by Avraham Steiner of Israel, who has roots from Kojetin and has been researching the History of Kojetin's Jews for many years. The site has extensive information about the town. Jews first came to the town in the 12th century. I began communicating with Avraham who has since sent me gravestone pictures of four Hausners from the town (two of which are shown on page 6) thanks to the efforts of Mr. Ondrej Stepanek and Ms. Zuzana Krybusova from Kojetin who took about 500 photos of the Jewish Cemetery including the gravestones of the Hausner family. They also provided many other photos about Kojetin and we look forward to continued cooperation with them. Avraham has also sent a census listing from 1829 which is part of an article^{3,4} (see table 2, page 8) about Kojetin Jewry by Arthur Steiner, published in Gold's book in 1929 which lists two Jakob Hausners, perhaps one of whom is the father of Markus.

Avraham also sent an article about Jews who took last names in 1789⁵. This article indicates two persons who took the last name of Hausner when the Austrian chancellor decreed Jews had to take last names.

The above mentioned sources show that the SONNE, STERN and LEUNER families have connections with the HAUSNER family through marriages.

I have now talked with my cousin by phone and we have learned quite a bit about each other's families. We are now assembling a private family photo album on the Internet.

I have also spoken with Avraham Steiner about all the above information and I have agreed to help him set up a Kojetin research group. In addition, we have discussed setting up a website for the 500 Kojetin gravestone photos that he possesses. We welcome any information about Kojetin's Jews. I plan to visit Kojetin and Skala and several other ancestral towns and cities in Europe in the near future.

The 2009 IAJGS Conference in Philadelphia was a wonderful, exhausting, and enlightening experience. I feel like I'm ready to dig in and work really hard on my family genealogy this year.

The big highlight was lunch with five cousins of various degrees from my paternal grandmother's family which settled mostly in Philadelphia. We had a wonderful time exchanging photos and information. I've now got contact numbers for several new cousins, not only in Philadelphia, but in other parts of the U.S. I was also able to finally get the name of my gggrandfather and the correct first name of my ggrandmother on that side of the family. Too bad I still don't have a maiden name for her, but maybe someday.

I went on the cemetery tour to Mt. Sharon where I took photos of eleven KUPSOW/KUPTSOW/ KUPZOFF relatives buried there. An interesting note is that when my ggrandfather died in 1922, the son who had the stone carved, spelled the name KUPSOW, the way my family spelled it. Then when my ggrandmother died in 1936, a different son arranged for the stone and spelled her name on the stone as KUPTSOW, the way that son spelled his name.

In all the rush of the cemetery tour I neglected to look at the back of my ggrandparents' two stones for any Hebrew that might be written there, as the front of the stones were engraved ony in English. My new cousin Stephen Kupsov (the original spelling) graciously returned to Mt. Sharon the next day to photograph the stones again and found that there *was* Hebrew written on the back of the stones. My ggrandmother's stone corrected her first name as Shprinze instead of Springe and gave her father's name as Nissan. My ggrandfather's stone showed his father's Hebrew name to be Asher Zelig.

This could be the connecting link to the KUPSOV family mentioned in David Chapin's book, *The Road From Letichev*.

Capital Collections is Being Updated

Two years ago the Jewish Genealogy Society of Greater Washington updated its publication, *Capital Collections: Resources for Jewish Genealogical Research in the Washington, DC Area* and version 4 was published in March. With our hosted Conference just two years away, we are looking at this guide with fresh eyes.

We are hoping to sell a lot of copies of *Capital Collections* in advance to genealogists who will be attending the DC2011 Conference in August, 2011. With this in mind, we want to ensure that the book is as complete as it can be. Unlike many attendees to Conferences in other areas, most of the people who come to DC come for our programs, speakers, and repositories; relatively few will come because of family ties to the area.

The update that resulted in version 4 included corrections to spelling, to format, and to remove duplicate entries. In addition, a section was added detailing transportation, contact information, and hours of operation. We also added several smaller repositories: The National Library of Medicine and the House of the Temple Library and Museum.

The focus of the new edition will be additional repositories including: The Washington National Records Center, the Naval Historical Center, the Jewish Historical Society and the Jewish Genealogy Society of Greater Washington's Library. We are looking for members to write entries about these repositories and we are hoping that there will be additional suggestions regarding other facilities that might be of use and interest by researchers.
