

***Introduction to the
1898 Census
of the Jewish Population
Living in Podu Iloaiei, Romania***

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1 Forward

It gives me great pleasure to reproduce the 1898 Podu Iloaiei Census.

The census was extracted from the State Archives in Iasi, by Dr. Itic Svart-Kara and in 1990 was published in his book **Obstea Evreiasca din...Podu Iloaiei**. It was later translated into English and made available to ROM-SIG by arrangement of Nat Abramowitz. In July 2001 I scanned it into the current electronic format (see accompanying Excel files).

2 The ROM-SIG Version

The following introduction appeared together with the census in **ROM-SIG NEWS, Vol. 5, No. 2, Winter 1996-97**:

Podu Iloaiei, a small and poor town in the Moldavian region of Romania, does not appear on many maps. It is about 17 miles west and slightly north of the famous city of Iasi. Yet a book of 168 tightly printed pages about this town's Jewish life was published in 1990, describing (in Romanian) its history, local economy, cultural activities, synagogues, rabbinical traditions, etc. Of special interest to genealogists, the book also contains several censuses of the Jews living in this town. The earliest was dated 1824 and the latest 1898. It is the 1898 census, consisting of some 723 names and taking up just 26 pages, that we have extracted and translated.

The task was a truly communal one: Nat Abramowitz did most of the translation, but several of the archaic words for various occupations stumped him. We sent the words out over the Internet to over 140 of our members and elicited many replies. In particular, Sandi Goldsmith just "happened" to be in Bucharest and engaged the entire staff of her husband's branch office in solving the definitions. Also, Marcel and Mary Bratu pulled out their own ancient dictionary and defined many of the words.

*The book is **Obstea Evreiasca din...Podu Iloaiei** (The Jewish Community of Podu Iloaiei), and is subtitled "Pages from the History of a Moldavian Shtetl" Much of the narrative material was written by Dr. Kara, although several others also contributed. We believe that many of the first 97 pages, which precede the census tables, would be of interest to our members, but we need one or more volunteers to review the material and translate the best parts into English. Any volunteers?*

In translating the census table, we encountered several odd words and apparent inconsistencies. Where there was not room to comment within the table, we inserted a code, such as [ac]. All such codes are explained in a list that follows the table.

We also include here a list of the occupations found in the census table. This may be useful for our readers when translating other documents.

2.1 Explanatory Codes

These are the explanatory codes used by Nat Abramowitz in the RomSig edition.

Aa	#1 and #3 say <i>vaduva</i> (widow), yet these are men with wives. Perhaps #2 and #4 are the widows intended. On the other hand, #56, 402, 403, 452, 517 say <i>vaduv</i> (widower), but entry is for a woman.
Ab	Entry is <i>sotie</i> (spouse); her name was not learned
Ac	#211: age 24, but in Podu Iloaiei for 30 years!
Ad	#224: 3 <i>ucenici</i> (apprentices)
Ae	#295: in Children column... <i>un serv de 15 ani</i> (a 15-year-old male servant)
Af	#310: 1 <i>ucenic</i> (apprentice)
Ag	Various, including #312: 1 <i>serv</i> (servitor, bondsman)
Ah	#327, #328: no entry in these columns
ai	#374: 1 <i>frate mic</i> (young brother)
aj	#482: 6 children, 1 <i>frate</i> (brother)
Ak	#496,497: #497 says "spouse of the <i>haham</i> ." She may be the spouse of #496. Note same ages and same time in Podu Iloaiei, yet different last names.
Ba	#340: abbreviated as <i>serv</i> . Thus, we dont know the gender of this servant.
Bb	#208: says <i>vaduva</i> (widow), yet both names appear to be female
Be	#328: <i>venit acum</i> (just arrived)
Bd	#700: male's age is 21 , wife's age is 52
Be	#706: male's age is 28, wife's age is 60

2.2 Occupations

Nat Abramowitz had the following occupations, appearing in the census, translated from Romanian to English.

3 The Electronic Version

3.1 *How It Was Produced*

The census was scanned into electronic format by KM Elias in July/2001 from the ROM-SIG hardcopy. Unfortunately the results were not perfect. The Optical Character Recognition (OCR) software had difficulty with Romanian accented letters such as S and T. In most cases S became a special character and T became a J. The resulting document was edited and these were changed to unaccented S and Ts. Therefore when you see letters S and T, please beware that they may really be accented letters (pronounced as Sh and Tz respectively). The OCR software caused other problems as well. We corrected whatever we found, however there is the possibility that some errors were overlooked.

3.2 *New Features*

We have also added a new column, Last Name, to the electronic version of the census. The ability to sort by last name will help researchers find information more easily.

In most cases we arrived at the surname by stripping away everything except the last word of the full name. This rule does not always work well, especially in the case of women. For example:

4 Additional Notes

4.1 Surnames

Some JewishGen/Podulloaiei researchers have been disappointed not finding their ancestors in the census. I must caution that the census in its current form may not be complete. The material went through a lot of different processes:

- Kara transcribing from the source documents (which themselves may have been incomplete)
- Printing of Kara's book
- Nat Abramowitz transcribing and translating the material in the book for publication in the RomSig Journal.
- My electronic scanning of the RomSig material. (After scanning there was still a lot of tidying up to do, but that wouldn't account for missing records – only misspelled names).

But I wouldn't rush to any conclusions. I was also perplexed why the siblings of my great-grandparents were missing from the census, until I found other civic records showing them residing in some of the surrounding communities.

Another major obstacle in identifying ancestors is the fact that a large number of entries appear without surnames. Apparently the adoption of surnames was a rather late innovation in PI. Nat Abramowicz couldn't find his father on the census because he didn't adopt the name Abramowicz until he left PI for America.

Others were more successful in finding their ancestors amongst the non-surnamed entries such as Avram sin Moise. So look closely at all the entries.

4.2 Given Names

The letters in the Romanian alphabet do not always sound phonetically the same as they do in English. Consequently the Hebrew and Yiddish origins of many given names listed in the census may not be readily apparent. The following table shows the origins.
