Skill Building exercise #5: Explore the Home Page

Belarus is a country with a long history of border changes. While geographic coordinates have been the same, place names, ruling governments, the power of the Jewish Kehilla, allegiance, language, record depositories, tax rolls and laws changed many times.



The red line indicates the modern boundaries of Belarus. Note that Grodno, Vilna and Vitebsk and a small part of Polesie in Minsk are now in other Countries.

Every country has special ways to identify geographical areas. Belarus (White Russia) is a modern name for an old region that uses *Jurisdiction titles* (Governates and Voivodeships) originally of Russian and Polish origin.

The Belarus SIG site uses *Gubernia* (pl. Gubernias) to describe these jurisdictions before 1900.

- Choose your Gubernia and open the hyperlink. Notice that this Gubernia Page (Communities) gives you a link to modern names and modern boundaries from a Belarusian Website Cities of Belarus.

Skill Building Exercise #8: Search for a SURNAME

The JewishGen Search capability expands a simple search by giving you the opportunity to use **filters**. A filter defines your search.

The Belarus SIG All Belarus Database currently uses these filters

- Put the name HURWITZ into the search menu. The menu box asks you if you want to use "phonetically like" "sounds like" "starts with" (at least 3 letters i.e. HUR) "is exactly". Each choice will give you different results. Using the spelling HURWITZ try all of these choices.
- Notice that the "returns" are grouped by country. Some results are in Belarus. Some are in Lithuania; some are in Latvia and some in Poland. Some are in the United States.
- Why?
- Go back to the search screen. This time choose a Region GRODNO Now you have filtered the search engine to have 3 filters: the surname and Phonetically (HURWITZ) and the Region (Grodno).

This limits the results to Belarus, Poland and the United States.

Skill Building Exercise #9: Search for your Ancestors

- Choose one of your own surnames.
- Decide on how you want to filter your search.

When your search results appear: **notice that you can click either on the left or the right.** Both hyperlinks take you to different information. The **Description** (on the left) takes you to information on how the database information was gathered, from where, how it was transcribed and what you can expect to learn from the record.

On the right you can click on the results of your search.

The Belarus Birth Database has 105 records for a surname that is phonetically like HURWITZ in the Grodno Region.
