

Grow Your Tree

The preparation section helps you to find and focus on the essential information you need to find records for your ancestors in Belarus. The names and dates you have may not match the records you find through the JewishGen and Belarus SIG databases.



Skill Building Exercise #24: Create an Hourglass Tree

- The easiest way to do this is with paper and pencil. Since you are going to use your hourglass chart as a guide when you search the Belarus SIG, the chart does not have to be a formal pedigree chart. What you want is the following information if possible:
- Names, dates and places
- The original surname
- The Yiddish or Hebrew given name
- → The place of last residence
- Relatives' and parents' names

Headstones carry information important about given names and dates. A burial society (landsmanshaften) can give important information about places.
