2016 has been a year of change for SBJC, and a year of firsts:

We have a change of Rabbi - Charley has made a fantastic first impression, and will be a real asset to SBJC;

We have changed the time of the "early service" to make it easier for families with younger children to come to the service;



We have changed the date of Cheder from Sunday to Saturday to allow the children to be more actively engaged in our Shabbat Morning services, and to enable those who would not normally go to Cheder to see how much our children have to give. This means that in term time, we will now have two Shabbat morning service a month.

Treasurer's report

This report covers the period from 1st September 2015 to 31st August 2016.

The Financial Accounts have been audited by Danny Baker, FCA, FIIA, and are included with the AGM papers.

SBJC has had a second consecutive year with a healthy financial surplus, of £13,430 (compared to a surplus last year of £10,229).

Two factors explain most of the income changes year-on-year:

Subscription income increased by 7.9% (whereas subscriptions for members only increased by around 2%). This is an excellent result and a sign of a vibrant, growing community.

However, overall income was 5.2% lower than the previous year. This was mainly because donations were much lower – only 40% of the previous year's donation figure. Large donations are inevitably "lumpy" and in prior years we have often received sizeable one-off donations or legacies.

Nevertheless, despite lower income, our surplus increased overall. This was largely due to the five month gap where we did not have a serving Rabbi between Rachel leaving and Charley joining. Rabbinic costs, which are typically just over half of our cost base, were 29% lower year-on-year.

This £13,430 surplus is posted to our General Fund reserves at year-end, which thus increased to £85,310. The Building Fund, with the addition of some small further donations and bank interest, now stands at £153,539.

The chart below shows the 3-year trend of the main categories of income and expenditure:



The growth in subscription income can clearly be seen in the first cluster of columns, and the fall in donations can be seen in the second. In the third cluster, you can see the one-off reduction in Rabbinic costs.

The net result, in the final cluster of columns, shows a healthy and increasing surplus. However, if we had received a full year of Rabbinic support, we would have had a surplus of under £3,000, i.e. lower than two years ago. So while we are in good shape financially, we do need to keep control of expenses and focus our efforts on fundraising to supplement our subscription income. And if we are fortunate enough to get a building, we would absolutely need to grow our membership and donor base to cover the running costs...

In terms of fundraising, our Kol Nidre Appeal (2015) raised just over £5,000. From this, £1,500 was donated to Save a Child's Heart and £1,500 to the Chiltern Multiple Sclerosis Centre.



This has been my first year as SBJC's Treasurer and I am grateful to my predecessors for their continued guidance. Next year's accounts will look rather different as we have moved into the world of online banking and cloud-based accounting software!

Danny Baker has indicated his willingness to continue as auditor for 2016-17.

Cheder Report

It's been a year since I became the Head Teacher of the SBJC Cheder, and I'm pleased to report that we continue to go from strength to strength, something I'm very proud of considering the enormous changes we've experienced in the last 18 months.

The huge amount of work and effort that Rabbi Rachel put into the Cheder during her time as Head Teacher should be acknowledged, and she set down a solid and positive base from which we've been able to build and develop. The arrival of Rabbi Charley in May

2016 has meant that we've had the opportunity to look at what was working best and to think of ways to continue moving forward, for the benefit of the children and the SBJC community. We felt strongly that the emphasis of our Cheder should be on teaching and preparing our children about the importance of being part of a community and the central element of what brings us together as a Liberal Jewish Community, i.e. our Shabbat Services. Meeting on a Sunday morning at the Ley Hill School has meant that the children's learning and socialising takes place in isolation, away from the main part of our community and we wanted to make their education more relevant and make better connections between what we're teaching and what they're experiencing.

So we decided to make a big change and move Cheder to Saturdays, with the view that we would combine two Cheder sessions a month with Shabbat morning services. At the same time we looked at our curriculum and decided that we would use the Shabbat service as our basis, building in wider Jewish learning around it. The result is that we aim for our children to feel more comfortable when attending services, to experience being a real part of the SBJC community and to begin to participate in services which we can build on as they approach B'nei Mitzvah and Kabbalat Torah. The added bonus is that the wider SBJC community can share in the wonderful work and ideas our children produce, and to experience the vibrant and colourful atmosphere generated at Cheder. Moreover, having instigated a peer-led model to our Hebrew teaching some time ago, the changes we have made to the timing and curriculum will consolidate the things the children are learning in sessions by bringing them to a live service where they can practice and utilise the Hebrew from the classroom.

At this point, I must thank our Cheder teachers who have not only kept me sane but continue to provide interesting, educational and fun sessions for the children week on week. Becky Bealing teaches our youngest class, Nick Prag is responsible for the middle class and Rabbi Charley has taken on the Bar/Bat Mitzvah class from me. This has allowed me the time to observe their different teaching styles and I am always delighted to see how engaged and enthusiastic the children are when working in their classes. During Hebrew sessions all the children work in the same room but at their own pace and level which allows our teachers the opportunity to work with different children to work with and support each other.

It will take time for the changes we have made over this last year to settle, and there have been plenty of teething troubles too. However, I must thank our parents for being so accommodating and understanding with what we're trying to do. Not one family has responded negatively and although we have had some discussions about how to make the changes work for individual families, everyone has understood why the changes have come about and tried to meet us half way, and I have appreciated that support so much. This positive attitude has been reflected in our attendances and for a small community such as ours to have 28 children on our register is truly fantastic.

Of course, Cheder is just one aspect of the teaching we provide for our children. Sally Geneen continues to run a thriving Gan (toddler) group - ably supported by Karen levy - meeting once a month at Ley Hill School, and regularly has 10-15 children attending (these children are pre-Cheder age and additional to the Cheder roster), ranging in age from babies to 6 years. Sally's sessions are always busy, noisy and exciting and the children love to show the work they've been doing as they leave, and means the transition into Cheder is a much easier one. These sessions also allow parents to meet and socialise and to build up a relationship with SBJC. My thanks to Sally and Karen for the wonderful work they do to facilitate that group.

I also want to acknowledge our Kabbalat Torah teachers, Ruth Harris and Gerard Geneen. They have invested so much time and effort into our current KT group who are really fortunate to benefit from their extensive knowledge and boundless enthusiasm. Ruth and Gerard have organised and facilitated sessions in their own homes, outings

and trips and constantly create fun and interesting things for the group to do in preparation for their forthcoming KT service. We are all sorry that Gerard is temporarily unable to continue teaching but look forward to welcoming him back very soon and wish him a speedy recovery.

In terms of moving forward, 2017 will be a busy year. We have a KT service coming up in the next month for Sarah Bealing and Georgia Simmons, the Bat-Mitzvah of Jasmin Harker in March and the Bar-Mitzvah of Ethan Davies in April. Jasmin and Ethan will form the new KT group from September, and then we will have six more B'nei Mitzvah between September 2017 and August 2018 – not bad for a small community.

One of the things I am most proud of at our Cheder is that there are no divisions between any of our children. The oldest look after, play and support the youngest - this has always been the way in my experience of SBJC Cheder and I'm proud to say has not changed one bit over the years, and is often the first thing visitors notice when they come. Sometimes I wonder if the children are learning what we want them to learn, as any teacher does, but I always return to the same core belief, which is that if the only thing we provide for our children is a safe, caring, positive environment in which to share time and enjoy exploring their Judaism with other Liberal Jewish children then that's not too bad at all.
