The Council presents it's report and accounts for the year ended 29 February 2012

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts, the special provisions relating to small companies within part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and comply with the Synagogue's governing document,

Structure, governance and management

The Synagogue is a company limited by guarantee. It is governed by its memorandum and articles of association together with rules and bye laws made for the proper conduct and management of the Synagogue.

Members of the Synagogue who have been members for an unbroken period of not less than two years and are over 21 years of age may stand for election to the Council The first members of the Council are those notified to Companies House as the the first members of the Council of the Synagogue but subsequent Council members are generally appointed at the Annual General Meeting

None of the members of the Council has any beneficial interest in the company All of the members of the Council are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up

The induction process of newly appointed Council members comprises an initial meeting with Council members followed by short meetings with key members of staff. They are provided with a welcome pack which includes the memorandum and articles of association and bye laws of the Synagogue, the last three years accounts which currently include accounts of the predecessor organisation and the Charity Commission's guidance "The Essential Trustee"

Council members are covered by indemnity insurance the annual premium is £536

The Synagogue is run by a Council of up to twenty members who are elected at the Annual General Meeting In addition, the Council can co-opt up to three additional members. The Council generally makes decisions based on the recommendations of appropriate sub committees

Day to day running of the Synagogue is overseen by the Synagogue administrator

Hendon Reform Synagogue is a constituent member of the Movement for Reform Judaism ("MRJ") The MRJ supports individuals, rabbis and synagogues in communities across the UK to meet their spiritual, social and educational needs

COUNCIL MEMBERS' REPORT (CONTINUED)

Each year the Council assesses the major risks to which the Synagogue is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks

There are significant external risks to funding exacerbated by the difficult economic climate and so a Strategy Group has been formed to assist the Council

Internal control risks are minimised by procedures for the authorisation of transactions

Investment risk is managed by the appointment of external invesment advisors who make recommendations to an Investment Committee

Appropriate Criminal Records Bureau (CRB) checks are made on all those who work with children or other vulnerable groups

Objectives and activities

The Synagogue is a congregation following the Jewish religion with the aims of providing and maintaining a place for the purpose of public worship and advancing religious, educational and charitable activities. The restricted funds comprise donations received for specific use within the Synagogue together with funds held for particular charities and charitable activities. The policies adopted in furtherance of these objects are to conduct a range of religious services and ceremonies, provide a Jewish education both to children and adults, provide nursery school facilities, organise a range of social, educational and cultural events and provide support within the community.

The Charities Act 2011 requires all charities to meet the legal requirement that its aims are for the public benefit. The Charity Commission in its Charities and Public Benefit guidance states that there are two key principles to be met in order to show that an organisation's aims are for the public benefit firstly, there must be an identifiable benefit or benefits and secondly, that the benefit must be to the public or a section of the public. The Council have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Synagogue should undertake and consider that they have complied with Section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 and the guidance in respect of public benefit

The Synagogue conducts religious services on Friday evenings, Saturday mornings, Jewish festivals and High Holydays Some services are conducted jointly with other synagogues Access to our services is free and is open to members and visitors alike During the High Holydays access is open to all and non-members are welcome to purchase a ticket. We provide free High Holyday tickets for young adults under 30 During the year we carried out a number of successful youth and children services where participants of all ages took an active role in prayer and readings.

Members of the community were supported by the Rabbis in times of bereavement and by the voluntary Caring Committee which reaches out to members during illness or personal difficulties. This group is made up of dedicated volunteers within our own community.

The Synagogue has a religion school for children from Reception age up to year 12 The religion school meets on Sunday mornings and is supported by Valerie Boyd-Hellner our director of Education and Deborah Bright, the school administrator Our GCSE class, led by Rabbi Steven Katz, meets on Sunday mornings and accommodates children who wish to start the course at year 8 We run a successful Bar/Bat Mitzvah class on Saturdays before the morning service. In addition to formal classes we have a range of formal and informal activities for children of all ages, including school trips, parties and social activities.

Adult Education is one of our major offerings to community members and visitors alike Torah Breakfasts are held at least once a month before the Saturday morning service. We have an adult education programme on Sunday mornings, which includes the provision of Hebrew classes (beginners and intermediate) and a series of lectures on religious, cultural, political and social affairs. Access to all our classes is free to members and visitors

Report from Rabbi Steven Katz BA (Hons)

A full Nursery School, monthly young children services attracting fifteen or more children, full cheder participation in Mitzva Day, bar/batmitzvah class holiday outings, the largest Jewish Studies GCSE class, all auger well for the future of Hendon Reform Synagogue

A cadre of devoted congregants bringing senior members to shul for Shabbat/Yom Tov services, a wonderful Caring Committee that offers home and hospital visits, shopping, and an annual shul Tea Party ensures that we look equally after our senior congregants

Then there is, to use the political jargon, the squeezed middle, those whose time is squeezed between looking after young school children and elderly parents. We also need a little of your time. Why ?

We would like some congregants to offer to drive our elderly congregants to shul, we would like more congregants to join in our Torah breakfast on Shabbat mornings. We would like more congregants to come to our Shabbat morning services and so connect with God, community and heritage

Speak to anyone involved in shul life and I am sure that what they have taken from the shul - sense of purpose, identity, joy, friendship - matches what they have given

The Hebrew word for "give" - " natan" is a palindrome, which can be read right to left, or left to right, so conveying a sense of mutual reciprocity. This reciprocity is the essence of shul life

So please come forward give and take in equal measure and take joy in both your giving and taking

Report of the Chairman, Mr A H Owen

I believe this has been the most difficult year in HRS' history, both financially and for us as a community Financially, we have had to make cutbacks that have had far reaching ramifications for the individuals involved and also for us as a community. We will, I promise you, come out of this stronger, more knowledgeable and with definite plans for our Synagogue's future and growth

On that note, the Strategy Group which evolved from a group of members volunteering to help Council at the EGM held in December 2011, have done a huge amount of work. They have split into groups, looked at various scenarios, suggestions and projects and have worked through these to make recommendations (initially to Council) and will report to you, our members, at the AGM. These thoughts and findings will pave the way for our Synagogue's future. Council thanks all involved for their hard work and help.

I am now coming to the end of my third year of a four year term as Chairman and I am planning to ensure the Synagogue is led by new and enthusiastic members whose interest in helping and building our community is paramount. We have at least four new proposals for Council members who we hope will be voted on to Council at the AGM and with them and support from the existing Council (who I thank for the help and support they have given both me and the Synagogue over this past year) we will I assure you, have strong leadership in the future

Our nursery school continues to thrive with parents putting their child's name down early to secure a place. We again received good comments from Ofsted, commenting particularly on the range of stimulating and varied learning and development experiences that are differentiated to meet the individual child's needs. The nursery works well to promote and support the needs of children with special educational needs and/or disabilities and provide all of the children with the skills they will need to give them a good start at primary school.

The Kingsley Fisher Hall has been used for Art & Keep Fit classes, Israeli & Zumba dancing classes, JACS, League of Jewish Women Association of Jewish Refugees, Jewish Lads and Girls Brigade, FZY & BBYO - to name but a few and has also been hired out in the past year for a multitude of events from Bar & Bat Mitzvah parties to Quiz Evenings. This all brings in added revenue to the Synagogue and ensures that our lifeblood, people, are constantly entering the building.

The Synagogue has hosted fifteen B'nei B'not Mitvah, eight Shabbat Chatanim [Aufruf], ten Weddings and six Baby Blessings in the last year. Our Head of Education, Valerie Boyd-Hellner has ensured our Youth are constantly stimulated with special services during the year and Rabbi Yuval has worked hard to create a following of dedicated parents and children who attend the monthly children's service. These services and simchas not only bring new people into the Synagogue but enhance the atmosphere and give nachas to so many families.

My thanks again to our Services committee under Chairmanship of Laurence Permutt. The smooth running of all our services alongside the appointment of our new choirmaster Joseph Finlay is a great support to our Rabbis and an enjoyment to us all as members. Joseph is starting to introduce some new tunes into our services and this alongside a trial 'members' choir' where he will help participants join in and learn certain words and melodies, is a refreshing change and certainly creates more service participation. Welcome and thank you Joseph. Our 'Family Service' held in The Kingsley Fisher Hall at Rosh Hashanah was a huge success. As we were at capacity, it will be enlarged this year and we will also add a Yom Kippur family service, enabling all generations to be together or to take part in our more traditional service in the Synagogue.

Our Chavurah Group continues to meet bi-monthly (we would like to see more of you joining this group please) on a Friday evening following a short service. Our Communal Seder was a great success once more and our Chanukah Bazaar raised over £1,300 towards Synagogue funds. This was both a financial and social success Sh'ma, our bi-monthly magazine which has been under the editorship of Larry Ross for many years until his recent retirement is now being looked after by Diana Gosen with Larry still very much involved on the editorial board. We thank all involved in the magazine and all Synagogue members who help in all activities including the Kiddush's each week. We could not function without your help and support. A big thank you also to our Caring Committee, who do a wonderful job visiting our infirmed and needy members and making food for them when needed or when a close relative passes away.

The S O S appeal to bolster our funds raised over £36,000 and the HHD'S appeal raised over £30,000 in total so thank you all for supporting these causes and your Synagogue

Lastly but not least, I would like to thank Rabbi Steven, the Synagogue's Professional Staff, Volunteers to all groups and anyone who sits on a committee or helps our Synagogue in any way. Your help and participation makes my time as Chairman more enjoyable and more fulfilling. We are sad to lose Rabbi Yuval from our rabbinical team and Shirley Burns from our office staff. We wish Rabbi Yuval and his family all the very best in the future and hope they and Shirley will retain the close ties they have built up over the years with us

Financial review

There is a finance subcommittee which sets an annual budget, monitors performance against budget and meets at least four times a year. An investment subcommittee was formed during the year and they have appointed a firm of independent financial advisors, The Roberts Partnership, to manage the Synagogue's investments.

It is the policy of the Synagogue that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The Council consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the Synagogue's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. The free reserves at the period end were £215,633.

COUNCIL MEMBERS' REPORT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 29 FEBRUARY 2012

The difficult economic climate continues to have an impact on membership subscriptions received which comprises the Synagogue's principal source of funding Expenditure was incurred mainly on the day to day running of the Synagogue and its services. In addition 17 1/2% of the Synagogue's subscription income is paid to the Movement for Reform Judaism to support its activities.

The Synagogue also runs a nursery school which is funded wholly by fees charged to pupils

The Statement of Financial Activities on page 10 discloses the Trust's net movement in funds for the year of £82,434, which results in decreased total funds at the balance sheet date of £1,722,163

The increase in funds in the previous year of £748,116 included a surplus on the sale of a house which was occupied by the late Rabbi's wife. In order to obtain an income to finance the financial commitment to provide her with sheltered accommodation the majority of the proceeds which amounted to £753,116 have now been invested. However, The Synagogue had free reserves of only £400,000 available to transfer to a designated fund created for this purpose.

The aim of the investment portfolio is to achieve medium to longer term growth whilst providing income. This is to be achieved by investing into a balanced portfolio of funds that allow for diversification across all the major asset classes and across reputable investment houses.

The value of the investments decreased from £709,449 to £697,073 and this, whilst disappointing, was expected in the light of current market conditions

Investment income amounted to £11,519

Plans for the future

As explained in the Chairman's report, a Strategy Group has been formed to make recommendations to Council as regards the Synagogue's future and will report to the members at the AGM

Auditors

Gerald Edelman were appointed auditors to the company, a resolution proposing that they be re-appointed will be put to the members

It is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Synagogue and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention modified to include the revaluation of certain fixed assets

The Synagogue has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small Synagogue

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" ("SORP"), issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006

1 2 Incoming resources

Donations comprise amounts received during the year Legacies are credited in the year in which they are receivable. The Council does not regard a legacy as receivable until it can be measured with reasonable certainty and probate has been granted in respect of the legatee's estate.

Assets given for use by the Synagogue are recognised as incoming resources when receivable and are brought into the accounts at estimated cost

Subscriptions and other fees receivable are included on the basis of those due for the current year after making allowance for any amounts that are unlikely to be collected

Income tax recoverable has been included to the extent that it arises on subscriptions and other income received under gift aid in the year

Interest is accounted for on an accruals basis

13 Resources expended

Resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. The Synagogue is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT

Resources expended on generating voluntary income include the costs incurred by the Synagogue in generating membership subscriptions, voluntary income including donations and legacies, and on fundraising and other activities to raise funds

Resources expended on charitable activities comprise the resources applied by the Synagogue in meeting its charitable objectives. Such costs include the direct costs of the charitable activities together with those support costs incurred that enable these activities to be undertaken.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Staff costs have been allocated by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing £100 or more are stated at original cost or where original cost is not ascertainable, at valuation at the date such assets were first capitalised

Freehold land and buildings, scrolls, silver and other religious artefacts are not depreciated because the depreciation charge is not considered material. Such assets are subject to an annual impairment review

Depreciation is provided on other assets at rates calculated to write off the cost less their estimated residual value over their estimated useful lives on the straight line basis as follows

15 Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value

16 Pensions

Contributions to the Synagogue's defined contribution pension scheme are charged in the statement of financial activities for the year in which they are payable to the scheme

17 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Council to further the general objects of the Synagogue and which have not been designated for other purposes

Designated funds are unrestricted funds consisting of amounts allocated by the Council for Synagogue purposes. The aim and use of each fund is set out in the notes to the accounts.

Restricted funds comprise unexpended balances of donations held on trusts to be applied for specific purposes. Investment income and gains are allocated to the appropriate fund

1.8 Burial rights

Burial rights are included in intangible assets and written off over their expected useful life of 25 years
