### BRISTOL TALMUD TORAH.

As from Sunday November 9th, would Parents please note that Classes will commence at 10.00 a.m. and terminate at 12.15 p.m. In order that classes may commence promptly children should be present 10 minutes beforehand, at 9.50 a.m.

It is essential that children should attend regularly. Frequent absences on the part of even a few children make systematic teaching impossible. The Talmud Torah Committee have, after due consideration, come to the conclusion that children who stay away frequently and without just cause cannot be allowed to continue attending classes. The final result of irregular attendance is that diligent children are penalised for the shortcomings of the less diligent.

NEWS REVIEW TO THE BRISTOL WIZO GROUP by Mrs.T.C. Howard on 14th October, 1958.

This year the State of Israel has been celebrating her tenth amniversary and in the last News Review, presented before the summer recess, a full report of the festivities was given.

Now that all the tumult and the shouting have died and the joyful merrymsking has given way to the prosaic, down to earth business of living - and making a living, it is a good time to pause for a moment to look back over these ten difficult years.

In 1948 a state was created which had had no experience of self government and it is a tribute to the inherent democratic principles of the Jewish people that right from the start the government of the country was established on a parliamentary basis. Since then, despite military emergencies and despite the influx of immigrants from widely differing backgrounds, the majority of whom had no political experience whatsoever, elections have always preceded democratically and without

ever a dange of a dictator arising. Sir Winston Churchill is reported to have said on one occasion that whenever these Jews get together, there are two Prime Ministers and one leader of the Opposition. I am pleased to say that in this respect at least Israel has proved this very great man wrong.

In these ten years almost a million immigrants entered the country and although a few coming from countries like England, U.S.A. etc. were on the whole well educated and able immediately to work in agriculture or industry or in the academic field, yet the vest majority were grossly illiterate, unused to what we regard as the very minimal requirements in cleanliness and sanitation and still back in tribal times so far as agriculture was concerned. Think then, what constenation these arrivals must have caused, descending on Israel in droves as they did, very often without fair warning, owing to the fact that the country in which they had been living suddenly decided to make life difficult for them. Nevertheless, from the Frime Minister down through all status of Society, the population did not regard this mass immigration as a burden but rather as a challenge.

In the initial stages the primary consideration was housing which was obviously hopelessly inadequate: tented encampments sprang up overnicht like mushrooms, to be followed shortly afterwards by aluminium huts. In these dwellings, many of the immigrants became despondent and, soon, possessed of refugee camp mentality, their psychological condition deterioating rapidly and the areas of these ma'abarot being turned into slums. However, the powers that be tackled the problem with all the energy at their command and now, not only are all the immigrants housed but the general aim of the Government is to prepare houses first so that new arrivals maybe placed at once in homes of their own. All of us, at one time or another, have seen films showing the arrival of immigrants from, say; Morocco, how they slept under the bed instead of on it and such like absurdities. But it is with these and similar absurdities that Israel has had to contend and over which they have trimphed so completely.

Another fact of the problem was language. The vast majority of the newcomers knew Hobrew only as the language of prayer, being unable to converse either with Israelis or with immigrants from other countries.

The children were dealt with easily, the younger ones were packed off to school at the earliest opportunity and in a matter of weeks they could understand what was going on and in a matter of months they spoke like Sabras.

compulsory military service, youths and maidens alike and in that period they too learned the language.

The hard core of the probelm lay with the Adults. Not only was it difficult to teach them the language, but they had to be taught a totally new way of life, including customs of sexual equality and the like to which they were inherently opposed. Nevertheless, by dent of much travail, by the use of monumental tact and by not being discouraged at setbacks, even this seemingly insuperable problem is being overcome and becoming easier to overcome with each succeeding wave of new immigrants.

But, of course, the immigrants are not the only persons to reap the benefits of a compulsory and free education. All children go to school between the ages of five and fourteen. After this provision is made for those who wish to continue studying - at the University, at Technical and Agricultural Colleges and at schools for working people. This liberal policy for education has brought handsome rewards in the high standard of technical and technological progress, in scientific advancement and the high standard of scholarship, evidence of which we find here in Bristol in the quality of students who come to work and study here for varying periods.

Today, the basis of survial of a country is education - not education for its own sake, but the application of education for practical purposes. Education of Engineers to build new roads, to search for life giving water; to drill for costly oil, Education of scientists to increase crop yields, to continue atomic research, to gradicate disease, to start new industrial processes. Education of the army, Navy and Air Forces to keep the waters and borders of the country inviolate. And education of teachers who will pass on the torch of knowledge to those who come after. All this has Israel achieved in her first decade. All this and more also.

Despite Israelis having constantly to look over their shoulders for infiltrating marauders, production has soared, exports increased and food became more plentiful.

In transport Israel's shipping tonnage has increased tramendously and there is no need for me to underline the wonderful achievements of the El Al Airlines.

Although still dependant upon funds from abroad, many Israelis are confident that in the not too distant future they will be completely self supporting.

All this might well be regarded as a backcloth against which the event of this last summer have been played.

Throughout these ten years Israel has been the baby deer stalked unmercifully by rampaging tigers, and so when the tigers for once turned on each other. Israel crouched silently and watchfully behind her stalwart defences. The ten years of effort and integration had produced a loyal and united nation prepared for all eventualities.

In this particular instance the UNO policy of Nasser appeasement had glibly received its inevitable retribution by his interference in the internal affairs of Lebanon, Iraq and Persian Gulf states, although the Iraqui revolutionaries at the present hotly deny that they are indebted to Nasser for the success of their coup d'etat.

Nevertheless, U.S. troops rapidly followed by UNO observers stepped in the Lebanon and British troops were flown across Israeli territory to bolster the Hussein regime in Jordan. Then once again Russia intervened by sending a threatening note to Israel and the passage of planes was stopped forthwith.

A short while after this Mrs. Meir, the Foreign Minister, visited the Foreign Office here, after visiting the French and Italian Governments also, and is reported as saying "it has never been so easy is now to get understanding for Israel's case" She explained that it was now recognised that Israel was the only stabilising force in the Middle East and was starving both militarly and spiritually.

Some practical recognition of this comes with the very welcome news of only last week that Britain has sold two submarines to Israel which you need have no Year, Israel will know how to use to the best advantage.

So much for Israel's position vis a vis the Great Powers and the Arab States, but, a small country hereself, determinedly she is building friendships, political and financial, with other countries of similar standing.

Internally, the main pre-occupation is to make Israel economically independent, to which end new industries and new techniques are constantly being employed.

I feel, however, that this general review of the situation is sufficient and I will ask you to bear with me until the next review which I hope to devote to giving a more detailed picture of internal and our political affairs.
