MORE FROM IOWA CITY, by Renee Seager

In Shool there are very formal and thorough arrangements for welcoming Newcomers. There is a B'nai Frith, Hadassah and Sisterhood Groups. In all clubs the administration is departmentalised to such an extent that everyone HAS to do something and this certainly makes for enthusiasm. Services are not well attended except at High Festivals when two services are needed because so many people come along! These we found very interesting as they were interrupted with explanations and historical accounts in English and they were delivered to an attentive and decorous congregation.

T.V.is just about as poor as we expected but unfortunately the radio is worse, consisting largely of poor news bulletins, lengthy ads and popular songs: when the latter run out the most unbelieveably ancient ditties are produced somewhat hotted up and dimly recognisable sometimes as old English folk songs. There is of course an equivalent to Mrs.Dale. It is a group of no less than seven stortes serialised each day for a massive signature tune and two additional sentences. Stories last for years and one can easily keep up with such tit bits of fascination by listening once weekly. Happily the University have their own radio station W.S.U.I., and one finds oneself listening almost exclusively to this and to world news reports from New York which are excellent.
