MESSAGE FOR FURIM 1969/5729

We are again approaching the most popular festivel in our calendar, the Feast of Purim. We find at the end of the Book of Esther, the very important statement that:

"The Days of Furim shall not fail from among the Jews, and their remory shall not perish from their seed."

It is true the events which Purim commemorates have become a very topical subject in our present time.

On the Shebbat before Parim we are reminded to remember how Amalek ettacked the Jewish People as soon as they entered the wilderness. Amalek appears again in his descendent as the Arch Antisemite Haman in the Parim story. In our present time Amalek is acting again with forecity to undermine the existence of the State of Israel. Our present Amalekites are not aware of the fact that they too will not escape their retribution.

Purim proclaims a stern reminder to our adversaries. They will be caught in the trap they had planned for others. Little did Haman realise when he set up the gallows fifty cubits high that he and his ten sons would one day hang from them. History has always shown that the eternal Jewish people stands at the grave of its persecutors.

We observe Purim to recall the important lesson that the few can never substitute trust in human power for his unshakeable faith in God, as it is expressed in the beautiful prayer of SHOSHANAT YAKOV taken from the Talmud. "Thou hast ever been Israel's salvation and their hopes in every generation".

STRICTLY FOR WCMEN

ICED TUNA MOUSSE

Tinned selmon cooked kipper and smoked haddock can be used instead of the Tune, but be careful not to overseason if you use smoked fish. The recipe makes four generous helpings.

1 lerge tin tuns or alb. cooked fish.
1 tablespoon gelstine.
2 cup water.
1 tablespoon lemon juice.
1 tablespoon chopped chives or spring onion tops.
2 tablespoons tomato chutney.
5 clt and pepper.
2 cup mayonnaise
3 cup double cream.

Drain the oil from the tune and flake the fish with a fork. Dissolve the gelatine in water and leave to cool. When it begins to thicken add lemon juice, chives and tomato chutney and mix well. Gently fold in the fish and mayonnaise and season well. Whip the cream until stiff and fold it into the mixture. Rub a little clive oil round a ring mould and spoon in the mousse. Leave to set in the refrigerator for at least an hour. Unmould the mousse on to a bed of lettuce leaves and fill the centre with watercress, chopped cucumber.
