THE JEWS AND EDUCATION - A SNIPPET OF HISTORY

The Chachem, the Sage, the Scholar. A figure revered amongst Jews through the ages, and exalted above princes, priests, wealth, power.....well, anything. Why should this be? Why should Leo Rosten be able to say of the Sage that "he stood atop the Jewish pyramid of respect"? The answer, of course, is not too difficult to grasp. The Sage stands as the symbol of the respect that Jews hold for learning. Not the rote learning of cheder and school (remember, the Melamed is often a derisory figure) but the pursuit of those special delicacies of truth and insight that are summed up in the word 'wisdom'. The Sage was, simply, the wise man.

This respect has manifested itself in many guises. The one we would all recognise today is the 'education as a meal-ticket to self-respect and material security' attitude, to fully appreciate which you certainly do have to be Jewish. (The proud mother introduces her newly born twins - "Chaim, the brain surgeon and Avrum the accountant: ::) But this can too easily be attributed to fears of rejection by the surrounding non-Jewish community. It does go very much deeper than that. Witness the persistence with which the timiest community will maintain a cheder, and Rabbis in the past have forbidden Jews to live where no Nebrew teacher was available. In the darkest hours of Jewry, in the Chetto Period of the Middle Ages, and "at a time when the overwhelming majority of mankind was illiterate," Leo Rosten tells us, "there was hardly a Jew over the age of five who could not read and write". An! it goes further than this. The fervour with which the Jews pursued the educational ideal led to as great a sophistication in educational provision as the English have only just managed to achieve in the last 50 years, but as long ago as 70 C.E. at which time it has been recorded that Jewish communities commonly had established a tertiary system of education; this including universal and free elementary education; had institutionalised teacher-training; and mainly under the influence of Hillel) had gone some way to offering free, comprehensive higher education. Some achtevement for the so frequently persecuted minority, so often stripped to the barest resources for survival!

The answer is, I believe, that education and learning - Torah - is the very source of life for the Jews. The spirit to survive is coupled with the need to advance. Merely to live is not sufficient for the Jews who have also to be ALIVE!

THE JEWS AND EDUCATION (continued)

And this they achieve through learning. And so that the world of learning is kept always within the reach of the whole community, that all can benefit from its radiance, the standard-bearer, the symbol is a 'folkementh'. He is, once more, the Sage. He is not a professor or a politician. He is probably to artisan, a poor man, a diray man, an itinerance. But his soul is the purest. Said Jose bun Josef of Zaroda's

"Let the know be a morting-house for the Sages, and riv in the dust at their feet and drink in their words with thirst."

We suspicious as the intense, he to the professional who teaches schind the closed doors of the cheder and who confines himsels, moreover, to the nametics of the ignorant (the child). But welcome the Sage who is a man like yourself, living to your world, who has risen to the peaks of understanding from the same ledge upon which you are parched now.

The Sage is not unique to the Jewish culture. He is not unlike the Ukudas, for example, But how unlike the communities managet which we live now. The people who exto' wealth, power, position and privilege would not recognise the Sage; would not bask in the warmth of understanding that comes when the mouth talks of the Chachem. The individual who raises his sword to defend himself would not understand the strength and security of a nation that has produced a Sage.
