#### MESSAGE FOR PURIM 1978/5738.

We find in the Book of DEUTERONOMY, Chapter 32, Verse 7 the following famous quotation:

"Z'CHOR YEMOT OLAM BINU SH'NOT DOR VADOR"

"Remember the days of old, consider the years of many generations".

There is hardly any occurence in our past history which has become so popular than the great event of our PURIM Festival which took place over two thousand years ago. It's popularity is not only described in the Talmud and Midrash and in modern literature of the famous Yiddish writers of Sholem Aleichem and in the works of Agnon in Israel, but we also find the spirit of Purim in music, drama and folk-songs. The Reading of the Megillah on PURIM has not lost it's vitality to us in our present time. We always admire the characters of Queen Esther and Mordecai who were risking their lives to safeguard the future of the Jewish people. They have been an inspiration not only for the Jewish people of Persia but they are still a shining example to the Jewish people in our present time. They were successful because when the situation for the Jews in Persia became very dangerous they took the initiative to appeal to them to changetheir attitude and to be aware of their obligations as Jews.

Our message for PURIM is our present time is to follow the example of our great heroes. It will be our duty to bring up our children in the way Mordecai did when he brought thousands of children together to encourage them to study the Torah and have faith in G'd and not to be afraid about the future. As we are reading on PURIM about the defeat of AMALEK, the arch enemy of the Jewish people and his descendant Haman, having also in mind the downfall of Hitler and his associates, so we may look with confidence in the future in our present time that our adversaries in Russia and in the Arah States will realise that the State of Israel has not only the right to exist, but that it will be for a beneficial influence to the whole of the Middle East and to humanity at large.

Let us hope that the peace initiative which is taking place at present between the United States, Egypt and Israel will lead to a successful result and that Jews from Russia will be able to continue to arrive in Israel to be reunited with their families.

In this way let us celebrate the approaching Festival of PURIM in the traditional spirit with our Bethren in Israel as we find it stated in the Book of Esther, Chapter 9 Verses 27 and 28

"And the Jews took it upon themselves and upon their children to keep these two days every year throughout every generation in every family, in every city, and in every province, that the memory of these two days of PURIM should never be forgotten among the People".

Dear Sir,

When I went to Shool on Shabbat the 31st December last with my little daughter, to my surprise the gates were locked and there was no service. On the following week it was the same as before.

In greater hopes I went again on the 14th January. This time the gates were open and there was some heat, but alas, no minyan and only half lighting in stygian gloom, and a familiar layer of dust everywhere.

On Shabbat the 11th February, the coldest morning for years, I again went to Shool with my little daughter. Again there was no minyan and this time there was no lighting and no heat, but the dirt and dust were prospering and seemed to have settled in for a long term stay.

We crept away, saddened and unenlightened - I did not have the courage to sit in the cold and dark. My mind was taken up trying to answer the questions being put to me "Why is it so cold in here, Daddy?", "Where have the people gone?", "Are my friends coming, Daddy?", "Why don't they put the lights on?".

At the risk of incurring the wrath of my personal friends on the Council I am bound to ask what is the Council really doing about all this. Is there not such a thing as a Contract Cleaner?. Can no-one be found to turn lights and heat on in the premises on a Saturday morning. Can the 'Recorder' not be used to tell members when the Rev. Modell intends to take a holiday.

We hear that the Council is discussing terms to sell the premises to the University, and there are hopes that we shall be paid an enormous sum to go away and find salvation in newer, greener pastures. If the Council thinks we shall find the Garden of Eden, remember that the Garden of Eden was only for Adam and Eye - there was no congregation there at all.

Our honary President has said that this Congregation has reached it's ebb; this may sound pessimistic, but it does imply the hope that the tidal waters will eventually flood back to bring fair sailing again. Let us hope he is right, and that the waters have not entirely dried up as they appear to have done.

It started off as a normal Saturday night. I had spent the day at home as I was feeling slightly under par. Henry & Glen arrived home at 6.p.m. saying the wind had whipped up and the slight fall of snow we had had during the day was being driven into the roads. I didn't take much notice as they usually had some mizza to tell me when they came home. At about 9.p.m. the phone rang. It was my housekeeper phoning from Bristol to say that a blizzard was raging and they couldn't get back and would spend the night with their parents. I went to bed still feeling unwell and Henry promised to get me breakfast in bed in the morning.

I was awakened at 7.30.a.m. by Henry opening the curtains to admire the view which he does every norming, and his immortal words fell on my inert ears. "Bloody Hell we are completely cut off". The snow was 10 feet deep and the howling winds were blowing it off the fields and into the roads and as you watched you could see it getting higher and higher.

Just for a moment I had a horrible feeling of claustrophobia, but then my domesticated brain went into action. We were all together, so no worry there. Next thought, food. Henry and Glen dug a path through to the garage where the deep freeze is housed. Quick check - plenty of meat and veg, and about 24 bags of strawberries still there from the summer picking. How I hate frozen strawberries. If they hadn't been there I might have bought more bread to freeze. Never mind, I had plenty of flour and dried yeast I would make my own bread. "The birds are still trying to get there beaks through it"!

We had just finished breakfast when Laura said "Dad there's a man with a rope walking round the house". I immediately thought it must be the Boston Strangler. We all followed Henry to the back door telling him to be sure to keep the chain on before opening the door. I mean only a meshugana would brave this weather to get to us. It turned out to be a very good neighbour who had managed to get across the fields with a crate of milk which he had dragged along with the rope like a sledge. He told us to use it sparingly as it was showing again by this time and he did not think he would be able to get back.

Well, things seemed to be settling down and we had plenty of food and drink, the oil tanks were full so we were warm. Now to keep ourselves amused. We played snooker, darts and cards, that lasted about one hour, and we were fed up already. The cigarette situation was getting desperate, so the family decided to try and get across the fields to the local pub. I have never spent a more terrifying half hour. I watched them from the upstairs window going down the hill, then the wind came up again and they had to battle against a raging snow storm. The children managed quite well, but with Henry's weight he kept falling in the snow drifts. As he came in the back door puffing and blowing he said that warnings on the cigarette packets should read "it can damage NON-smokers health".

MONDAY. DAY.2.

Glen has dug his way out to the gates and is threatening to walk into Keynsham over the drifts in order to open the shop. Henry is threatening to get him certified if he doesn't come in. Laura is giving Suki the dog a sledge ride which she doesn't wish to partake of, and I am once again throwing my efforts of bread making out to the birds, but they are throwing it back at me. But wait a moment, what is this? Out of the snow loomed the biggest earth mover I have ever seen, pushing the snow into 20ft. walls on either side of the road. The road is full of people taking photographs and children are running and laughing and sliding on the ice. I am busy making tea for the

workmen. FREEDOM at last! But no, the workmen say they are only allowed to go as far as the Somerset border, after that it is Avon's responsibility to clear the road. So now we live in a giant cul de sac. The Frome road is blocked at the border, and the other end is blocked by a coach load of stranded people and abandoned cars.

#### TUESDAY DAY 3.

We are so bored we are even looking forward to Crossroads. Freezing rain and fog has now set in and the family are looking at each other like Antisemites. No fresh fruit, no bread and the larder looks like a disaster area. If only we had a Range Rover we could drove over the ice without any problems. A quick call to the garage. Yes, they have one for sale. Henry say's if they can get through with it we will buy it. Thaw has set in. Escape at last.
