SUDDENLY IT'S DANGEROUS TO BE A JEW

We live again, in dangerous times, or suddenly these times might be dangerous for us all.

Depending who's asking, there are half a dozen ways that one can quickly descibe ones self, Doctor, Consultant, Insurance Broker, Business person, stocky, tall, short, Londoner, Bristolian etc.

Whatever.

But scattered around Europe are those who would only ever think to describe us in a single word, that we rarely use to describe ourselves. To them, whatever else we are, say or do, is wholly summed up in the word "Jew".

Our parents were Jewish, as were theirs before them, and so on, until quite quickly, you get to those relatives who were routinely and casually beaten up in the streets of Russia and Poland, and who lived in fear of the next pogrom, or worse.

And there was worse.

Suddenly, over the past couple of weeks, being Jewish in Europe has started getting risky again.

In the Eastern European states a victous and endemic anti- semitism

has taken to the newly freed streets.

In Russia and Romania who Poland, the nationalists have come out from under which ever slimy stone they've been hiding for 50 years and are polling votes by claiming that the ills of their countries are the fault of the evil Jews rather than their communist dupes. In France freshly interred Jewish bodies have been raised from the graves, dismembered, and slung about the desecrated Jewish graveyards.

And in Britain the swastika daubers have gone to work on Britain's Jewish graveyards.

Most of us never witnessed what those of our parents and grandparents generations had witnessed in Britain: Oswald Mosley's and Colin Jordan's thugs beating up Jews on the streets and wrecking synagogues.

Anti- semitism is different from other types of racism, not worse, but different. When racist orators complain that there are too many blacks in this country, they are suggesting that blacks, somehow, are lesser people, fit only to scuttle around the world cheaply soaking up the employment slack. And on that level, Jews equally, get labelled as mean or sly, and when we complain get accused of being impatient and hysterical and told that things have changed since the historical hiccups at Buchenwald and Auschwitz.

Occasionaly when things start to go wrong in a country, people look around for someone to blame. And if they don't know who to blame, there are others who will give them the hint, and point them in the right direction. In Germany in the 30's the Jew's were to blame, In France it was the Jews again, and in Eastern Europe it looks as if it is going to be the Jews again.

And in Britain ?, In the 60's when Enoch Powell was on the roll it was the fault of the blacks. Now it might be the Jews - us again. Maybe the Edmonton cemetry got turned over by a few silly ignorant lads who'd had a few too many Special Brews.

But when, 50 years after they opened up Treblinka, one sees the words " JEWS OUT" freshly painted on a railway arch in the East End of London, one shivers, to think that it could happen all over again.

Are we burying our heads in the sand here in Bristol, in thinking that it could not happen again, and that Security at the Synagogue at all times is unecessary ?.

WEST QUEST 4

Cheltenham. A blazing summer's day at the end of April. Over 80 of us indoors, ignoring the glorious weather outside. Why?

We were there to celebrate West Quest 4 - the fourth gathering of people from the Jewish communities in the South West - with, I'm proud to say, a sizeable contingent from Bristol and Bath. Since most of the Recorder's readers will have read the very good account of the day's proceedings in the Jewish Chronicle, these are my impressions of the day, the things that spring to mind as I look back a month later.

First, how good it is to renew acquaintance with 'friends' from previous West Quests. They are achieving what they set out to do: creating a sense of regional community. Moreover they're moving from being outpourings of what we cannot do as small congregations, to constructive statements of what we are planning and the kind of assistance we expect from the 'centre'. Indeed, a measure of how effectively our voice is being heard is the presence of the Vice-President of the Board of Deputies and the Chair of the Provincial Committee. The latter is a whit patronising, but Judge Israel Finestein sounds sincere when he says that the Board must take seriously any perception in the regions that they are being overlooked or ignored.

Barry Green of Cheltenham makes a telling point. We are the small regional communities; not Manchester, Birmingham, Leeds. When he wishes to speak at the Board, he is often not called. The larger regional congregations have more delegates, but although out-of-London, they are not the authentic voice of the smaller communities struggling to flourish.

Two more impressions. My first visit to Cheltenham Synagogue. Not just as a gawping tourist - it is the most amazingly stylish and elegant building - but as a participant in a moving - because we were ourselves a coming together of Jews - Yom Haatzmaut service. Led by the indefatigable Malcolm Wiseman. We, the regional congregations, owe him a lot.

The day ends with a talk on the Jewish instruments of the Bible. Boring? Not a bit of it. Jeremy Montague is an enthusiast and communicates his love of enquiry and curiosity. Besides that, he has brought some of the instruments; more accurately, reconstructions or guesses as to what is meant by Biblical descriptions. The hall fills with weird and plaintive sounds. We are transported away, across the centuries.

The day has been religious, cultural, educative and social. It's passed - despite the call of the glorious weather outside - like a flash. Thank you Cheltenham organisers.

REPORT FROM COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON MAY 10th 1990

- I. It was agreed to decorate the lobby and front entrance and landing at the same time as the staircase is decorated, following the rendering work.
- 2. It was agreed to put in a doorway from the entrance hall of the top maisonette into one bedroom of the lower maisonette. This room will be used as a shop/office/classroom. The lower flat will be relet as a one bedroomed flat.
- 3. The Liaison Committee reported on a special meeting they had held which dealt with the welfare of elderly congregants. Proposals for home and hospital visits, car lifts to functions and services, regular meetings and lunches, and sheltered housing were topics which had been discussed.
- 4. The Religious Affairs Committee is to look at ways of ensuring there are Minyanim for Festivals in order to prevent services being cancelled due to low attendance.
- A booklet containing photographs from the exhibition which marked the 200th anniversary of the community is to be produced.

The next childrens service will take place on June 16 at approximately 11 o'clock.
