Whilst no service will be held in our Shool on the Morning of Monday, 16th, we would advise that the service at Stanmore Synagogue commences at 7.00 a.m. May we remind you that all first-born males should attend this service in order to absolve themselves from the Fast.

LAWS CONCERNING CHOMETZ ON PESSACH

From approximately one-and-a-half hours before midday on Erev Pessach, until nightfall of the eighth day of Pessach, one may neither derive benefit from nor even own, any chometz. The prohibition of eating chometz comes into force approximately two-and-a-half hours before midday - with the exact time to be determined annually for every individual location.

WHAT IS CHOMETZ?

Any wheat, barley, rye, oats or spelt which has been in contact with water or other liquids, must be considered as chometz, since fermentation may have set in. This applied where water came into contact either with the actual grain or with the flour or any other product of the grain. Only where special conditions are observed and conscientious supervision is exercised, as in the baking of matzoth, may water and flour be mingled for the use of Pessach foods.

EXAMPLES OF CHOMETZ

FLOUR PRODUCTS: Flour noodles, vermicelli, spaghetti, farvel, semolina, porridge, custard, bread, cake, biscuits, cookies, matzo and matzo-meal not specially prepared for Pessach.

CEREALS: Cornflakes, Shredded Wheat, Puffed Wheat, Weetabix and all other varieties.

MALT PRODUCTS: All malt and yeast products, vegetable extracts, mustards and other condiments.

BEVERAGES: Beer, whisky and other spirits, maltvinegar and pickled foods containing malt-vinegar, flavouring essences, Lucozade, glucose.

MEDICINES: Most medicines are suspect of containing chometz. In case of need, medicines should be especially prepared without chometz ingredients by a chemist, on doctor's instructions. Where this is not possible, a sha'alah must be asked.

ANIMAL FOODS: Many of these contain chometz.

FOOD PREPARED IN CHOMETZ VESSELS: All such food prepared before Pessach is to be treated as chometz.

The above list is not comprehensive and should merely be taken as a guide.

PULSES

Although pulses, such as beans and lentils do not come within the category of chometz, it is nevertheless a custom having the force of law not to eat them on Pessach, owing to their similarity to grain. However, they may remain in Jewish persons' possession during Pessach.

Examples of pulses: beans, peas, lentils, rice, soya beans, maize, cornflour, rice flour.

Where pulses need to be eaten for health reasons, a rabbinic authority should be consulted for a ruling.

DRIED FRUITS AND READY-MADE PRODUCTS

Since exceptional care is required in the preparation of foodstuffs for Pessach it is the established custom to eat only food prepared under rabbinic supervision.

This applies, for instance to prunes, dates, figs, raisins, dried apples and apricots, tinned fruits and vegetables, cheese, pickled meet, herrings, sardines and other fish-tins, smoked salmon, jam and honey.

CHOMETZ UTENSILS

Baking, cooking and eating utensils used during the year may not be used for Pessach. Although many utensils may be made fit for use on Pessach through kashering, most people find it more practical to obtain separate sets of milky and meaty dishes for Pessach, which are to be kept well out of the way during the year.

All chometz utensils have to be cleaned thoroughly and put away before Pessach. They should preferably be stored in a room which will not be entered during Pessach. Where this is not possible, they should either be locked away or put out of reach, e.g. on top of a cupboard or shelf.

PREPARING THE HOUSE FOR PESSACH

CLEANING THE HOUSE

In order to ascertain that one should have no chometz in one's possession during Pessach, an extensive house-cleaning is carried out before Pessach. All rooms and parts of the house into which chometz may have been brought at any time during the year, must be thoroughly cleaned. This applies to attics, pantries, cellars, offices, shops, garages, cars, wardrobes, drawers, pockets, handbags, shopping bags and travelling-cases. The cleaning operation naturally requires time and effort and most housewives find it expedient to commence it as early as possible, usually soon after Purim.

CLEANING THE KITCHEN

The kitchen needs to be cleaned with particular care, especially the tables, shelves, cupboards, sinks with their draining boards. Even after they have been scrubbed and cleaned, they are to be kept covered for the duration of Pessach with some suitable material such as wooden boards, hardboard, tin-foil, lino, Formica or plastic sheets.

The cooking surface of the gas or electric oven requires thorough cleaning.

If possible, all parts of it which usually come into contact with the pots and pans, should be replaced. If this cannot be done, the tops of all those parts must be covered with tin or tin-foil. Where it is possible to make these parts red-hot, there is no need to cover them. As regards the preparation for Pessach of a gas or electric oven normally used for baking, a qualified authority should be consulted.

The particular care with which it is customary for Jewish housewives to prepare their kitchens for Pessach cannot be adequately described in the present context.

SALE OF CHOMETZ

Since a Jewish person may not own chometz during Pessach, he will either have to give or sell to a non-Jew all chometz not used up before Pessach. The act of giving away or selling must take place not later than approximately one-and-a-half hours before the true midday of Erev Pessach. In order to avoid the trouble of actually transferring all the chometz to the houses of the non-Jew who acquires it, one arranges the sale in a manner whereby the places where the chometz is lying are either included in the sale or are let to the non-Jew.

COLLECTIVE SALE BY QUALIFIED RABBONIM

In order to ensure that the sale of chometz will have legal validity, it has become the custom to entrust this transaction to a competent Rav, who will arrange a collective sale. Since the Rav has to be appointed as agent by each individual seller of chometz, and since particulars of the items to be sold have to be given to him, a representative of each household in question has to visit the Rav during the days preceding Pessach to arrange this matter. The authorisation of the Rav as agent for the sale of chometz is effected through the signing of a document to this effect and the traditional act of acquisition on his part.

The formulation of the Contract of Sale makes it clear that the sale is an absolute one, and that the non-Jewish buyer is under no obligation to return or resell the chometz. The re-buying of chometz by the Jewish seller after Pessach is enterely dependent on the free decision and goodwillof the non-Jewish purchaser.

SEARCHING, ANNULLING AND BURNING OF CHOMETZ

SEARCHING

However well a Jewish house has been cleaned before Pessach a final search during the evening preceding Erev Pessach is still required. This search is conducted with the aid of a wax candle or a similar light to enable the searcher to look into all nooks and crannies. A berachah is recited before the search.

Where a Jewish person will be away from home during Pessach he must carry out the search for chometz during the night prior to his departure. No berachah is recited in such a case.

FIRST ANNULMENT

After completion of the search, the chometz has to be annulled by a declaration that all chometz which may have been overlooked shall be considered as non-existent, valueless and ownerless. Persons who do not understand the Aramaic text of the declaration as printed in the Siddur or Haggodah should make it in the language they understand.

Such chometz as is to be left over for the next morning must be stored safely so that none of it will be scattered.

BURNING

Next morning, approximately two hours before the real midday, all remaining chometz must be burned until it turns into ashes. After the burning, the chometz is annulled again as before, but the declaration now includes the words: "All chometz which may still be in my possession, whether known or not". This annulment should not be said later than approximately one-and-ahalf hours before midday but in any event not later than one hour before midday.

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RECIPES FOR PESACH

from Betty Segalov -

Boiled Fowl With Lemon Sauce:

Cover fowl with water, bring to boil and skim. Add 1 onion cut into quarters, 3 large sliced carrots, salt and pepper (1 bay leaf optional). Simmer between 2 to 4 hours, depending upon size of bird.

Remove fowl and correct seasoning of soup (add 1 Telma chicken cube if necessary). Section fowl, place in casserole or oven proof serving dish and squeeze over juice of a lemon.

Pour 1 pint of the soup into a small saucepan, mix together with juice of 1 lemon, 2 egg yolks and a little sugar. Heat gently, stirring constantly until thick. DO NOT BOIL THIS SAUCE. Pour enough of the sauce to cover the fowl and serve the remainder in a sauce boat separately. Serve hot; decorate with thin slices of lemon.

Potato Maison:

Slice into rings 6 good sized potatoes and 1 or 2 large Spanish onions. Place alternate layers of potatoes and onion finishing with a layer of potatoes in a medium size casserole or oven proof serving dish. In between each layer season with a little salt and pepper and 2 or 3 small knobs of margarine. Put a generous knob of margarine on top layer and bake in slow oven for about 1 hour. Serve hot.

Orange Pudding:

Ingredients - 1 pint orange juice, 2 tablespoons potato flour, sugar,
2 eggs, juice of a lemon, diced fresh fruit.

Method: Bring orange juice to the boil. (This can be a diluted concentrate, canned juice, or the juice of 4 fresh Jaffa oranges, brought up to 1 pint with water). Add the lemon juice and potato flour mixed with a little cold water. Mix well and boil for one minute. Remove from heat and mix in the fruit and enough sugar to taste.

Separate the yolks and whites of two eggs. When the orange mixture is cool, mix in the yolks. Whisk the whites until firm and blend into the mixture until it is clear.

Pour into small glasses and decorate with fruit, nuts or grated chocolate. Store in the refriderator until cold. Serves 4 - 6.

Avocado Salad:

Ingredients - 2 ripe avocados, 2 hard boiled eggs, salt, pepper, 1 clove
qarlic, juice of a lemon.

Method: Mash together the eggs and the peeled avocados with salt, pepper, crushed garlic and the juice of a lemon. Mix well together and serve either as an appetiser or a side salad on lettuce leaves. Serves 4 - 6.

Hazelnut Cake:

Ingredients - 4 eggs, separated; 4oz caster sugar; 4oz hazelnuts, minced.

Method: Mix the egg yolks with the sugar and hazelnuts until smooth and then fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in the centre of the oven, gas regulo mark 4, for approx. 30 mins. When cake is cool, it can be split in half and filled, or decorated on top, with whipped double cream.

(N.B. If a mincer if not available, a cheap mouli mincer is ideal).

"SIGNIFICANCE OF BEING BAR-MITZVA"

The Bar-mitzva ceremony is so far as the boy "chanting his portion" and the subsequent sumptious reception are concerned come and go, but the boy himself - the son of the commandment - goes on to the end of his mortal days. The very nomenclature "Bar-Mitzvah" stays with him at all times.

It is therefore imperative that everything possible within the limits of modern life and the circumstances surrounding him should have been done prior to him reaching the age of 13 so as to ensure that he feels the significance of being Bar-Mitzva. Unless he is enrolled in a Jewish Day School, the other alternative is his attendance at a recognised set of classes, at least three times a week from the age of 5 or 6, or in special circumstances, private tuition by a qualified teacher for 3 hours a week.

Parent's Duty

Whatever he learns - and with good teachers it could be quite substantial it should not be forgotten however, that the greater teachers are his
parents. The biblical injunction is as relevant as ever it was . . .
"And thou shalt teach them diligently to your children . . . V'diberrtah
Bam by way of the parents "speaking" and "acting" in the manner the Torah
demands of them.

This involves, inter alia, that mothers maintain a Jewish home, viz: Kosher foods, separate milk and meat dishes; lighting the Sabbath and Yomtov candles; the week of Pasover; fathers putting on Telfillin, making Kiddush and Havdala, reciting Hamotzee and Grace after Meals at least on Shabbat; attending Synagogue Services as regularly as possible. One assumes that there is a loyal, devoted and happy relationship between mother and father.

If the father is unable to read Hebrew in consequence of which he fails to make Kiddush, or put on Tefillin, he should nevertheless encourage his son to do these things. (There is an Adult Class for those who desire to improve their Hebrew reading.) He should neither feel guilty nor embarrassed.

Six months before his Barmitzva, every boy should be bought a new pair of Tefillin and attend our Sunday Morning Youth Service. He should also attend our Youth Service every Shabbat morning.

It is most sad when I learn of boys losing sight of this noble title Bar-Mitzva, the main causes of which are due to

- a) not having had a regular education before 13.
- b) poor teaching;
- c) lack of encouragement and sound example on the part of parents.

A Simple Test

Provided a boy has been attending regularly a Jewish Day School or Synagogue Hebrew Classes for four years prior to his Bar-Mitzva he will be entitled to read Maftir and Haftarah by passing a simple test.

- 1. Fluent reading of Hebrew.
- 2. Translation of Parasha.
- Translation of Shema, Amidah for Shabbat Shacharit; Friday night Kiddush; Grace after Meals.
- 4. Ability to locate familiar prayers in Siddur.
- Dinim relating to Teffillin.

This is such a simple test much of which will have been covered sometime or other during the four years that no parent should feel apprehensive or concerned. I would however, strongly advise all parents to insist on their sons practising their Hebrew reading aloud at home.
