editorial

PREEDOM - PAST AND PRESENT

The story of Purim shows us how near Persian Jewry was to extermination but for the timely intervention of Queen Esther and Mordechai and the humanity and gratitude of a king.

Forty years ago the millions of Jews in Europe were not so lucky for Hitler, the twentieth century Haman, and his army of thugs and weak-minded individuals all but achieved their goal.

And yet the saga repeats itself. Russia, never known for its love of Jews when ruled by the Czars, continues the theme of trying to eradicate Jewishness. Now it is slightly more subtle. The mass exterminations of Stalin's day have given way to psychological pressures and deprivation, constant scrutiny and forced unemployment which subsequently results in accusations of "anti-Soviet" activity - not being grateful for the glorious motherland - hoping that the spark of Judaism will eventually die.

It seems so long ago, Haman and Hitler, - and so far away - Persia and kussia, - that we forget it could be us or it could happen here. Months ago I wrote of the dangers of the National Front activity and was even advised not to describe it as Facist yet now the community, Jewish and non-Jewish, is on the defensive. Some misguided, irrational, leftish extremists are even on the offensive which has had the effect of making martyrs of the National Front.

Every Pesach we thank the Almighty for freeing us from bondage and giving us our freedom, yet there are those who would dearly love to be able to say that they are truly free. Let us not forget them at both Sederim and let us not forget that there are still those, within our borders, who would gladly see US demoralised, degraded and destroyed.

As you know, as part of the process or appointing a part-time minister we were visited by Kabbi Kass and habbi Lerner.

When subsequently reconsidering these and other applicants for the post the Ministerial Selection Committee felt absolutely certain that the position had to be considered as full-time.

Accordingly, a meeting was arranged between our Honorary Officers and Honorary Officers of the United Synagogue as a result of which certain preconditions were laid down following the acceptance of which we would be able to advertise for a full-time minister.

Hopefully, by the time you read this, the advertisement will have appeared in the "Jewish Chronicle".

It is right that members should be aware of one particular undertaking given by the Board of management; that if we shall have appointed a minister prior to wosh Hashanah 1978 the membership fees for a male schedule member shall be £69.00 p.a. with effect from kosh Hasnanah 1978. It is equally important to note tnat of this £10.00 increase over the current male schedule member's fees, £1.50 is due to an increase in Funeral Expenses Scheme contributions, £1.50 is due to an increase in the Additional Education Levy (both of these being approved and applied by the Council of the United Synagogue), and £1.00 is a levy which our board have approved as a contribution to the United Synagogue welfare Committee's Area Youth Officer Scheme in which we are going to participate.

So the actual financial implications of making a full-time appointment - including repayment of a considerable capital borrowing from the U.S. to help with the purchase of a minister's residence - will add

only £6.00 p.a. into the current fees for the year 19/8/79 <u>Ir</u> we have made the appointment prior to nosh hashanan 1978.

Please would you note that the A.G.M. will be on monday 22 May. This year is an Election Year; the ballot box will open at 7.30 p.m., the business of the meeting will commence at 8.30 p.m.

On behalf of the Community, may we express our thanks to the Gan Aviv Parents' Association.

Through their efforts over the last year we now have floor covering throughout the upstairs rooms as well as lampshades in all the classrooms. We are most grateful to the rarents' Association for this invaluable help in further equipping the synagogue premises.

About Purim

Two Purim Precepts

It has been shown how the physical elements most essential to man have been established by the Creator, in His great kindness, to be the most abundant and available. The same is true in the realm of the spiritual. Those Mitzvos most essential to the well-being of the Neshomo (soul), are precisely those that are the easiest to fulfill. This can be learned from the Mitzyos of the approaching festival of Purim. The following seven mitzvos are connected with the Purim festival. 1. Reading the Megilla, 2. Reading the special portion of the Torah set aside for Purim, 3. Saying the Al Hanissim Purim prayer in the Shemoneh Essray of the daily services and in the Birchas Hamozon (Grace after meals), 4. Prohibition of fasting and sadness, 5. To rejoice, to feast, and to drink to the extent that one reaches a state of great merriment, 6. Mishloach Monos sending food gifts to one's friends and, 7. Mattonos L'Evyonim - giving charity to the

Examination of these seven mitzvos in detail reveals that they are not equally easy to fulfill. Some are more complex than others and some require more preparation than others; however, the two mitzvos that express the essence of Purim better than any of the others (food gifts and charity) are also the easiest to observe.

Megilla: In order to read the Megilla, both a kosher Megilla and a trained reader (a Baal Koreh) are required. The Megilla must be written, without errors, in clearly legible and legally prescribed lettering, with a special ink on the parchment made from the skin of a Wosher animal. The writing is done by a

specially trained Sofer (scribe) with a reed or feather pen.

Reading the Torah: The laws governing the writing and reading in a Sefer Torah are even more stringent than those of the Megilla. In order to fulfill the Mitzva of reading the Torah on Purim, a kosher Sefer Torah, a trained reader and a Minyan (quorum of 10 adult males), are all required.

The Al Hanissim Prayer can only be said in the set prayer services or during the Birchas Hamozon (Grace after meals). In the latter case, one would obviously have had to complete the kind of meal over which Birchas Hamozon is said. In the former case, one would have had to complete a minimum sequence of prayers before he came to the suitable point in the service for fulfilling this Mitzya.

Rejoicing and the prohibition of fasting etc. are mitzvos which depend on the feelings and emotional state of the individual. The essence of these mitzvos is to meditate and dwell at length on those thoughts that generate a joyous frame of mind and to turn away from fasting and sadness.

All the above restrictions and preparations are completely unnecessary in the case of Mishloach Monos and Mattonos Lo'Evyonim, the last two Mitzvos. They do not even require a Brocho (blessing) to be pronounced at their fulfillment. All one must really do is to give two different kinds of edibles (e.g. an apple and a candy, or a cookie and some raisins) to one friend, and to donate one penny to each of two poor people.

It is evident from the above that the last two Mitzvos are the easiest to fulfill and are "readily available."

HASIDIC TALE

A Purim story told by the Sachatover Rebbe.

"In Cracow there lived a drunkard who was in the habit of drinking even more than usual a fortnight before and a fortnight after Purim.

He gave the following reason:
Haman was no fool. He understood
that it was not possible to find
all the Jews in a single day for
slaughter. It would take at
least a month to ferret them
out of their hiding places.
Hence, his original plan was
to devote the entire four weeks
of Adar for this purpose.

Later, it occurred to him that if his plan miscarried, and the Jews would have occasion to celebrate their deliverance, they would enjoy a month's festivity. This, Haman could not countenance and he therefore issued the decree for a single day's execution.

ror this reason, I consider it proper to defeat Haman's evil plan to limit our enjoyment and I celebrate the whole month."


AREA YOUTH SCHEME

PESACH RECIPES

Chocolate Florentines

2 egg whites (large) 3 oz icing sugar 2 oz plain choc. (grated)

5 oz blanched almonds

3 oz plain choc. (melted)

egg whites until stiff. Add is icing sugar and 1 oz. of grated chocolate. Whisk again. Fold in remaining icing sugar, chocolate and almonds. Place small heaps of mixture on baking sheet and bake in centre of pre-heated oven, (160°C, 325°F, Gas Mo. 3) until dry. Coat flat side in the melted chocolate and leave to harden.

Orange and Almond Cake

5 eggs

t cup ground almonds tablespoon grated

orange rind 1 cup sugar

cup fine matzo meal tablespoon orange juice.

Beat eggs in large bowl, add remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Pour mixture into buttered tin. Bake kegulo 4 or 350 F for about 2 hour. Gool in tin.

Shortcake

ilb Tomor ilb Sugar 1 standard egg 12 oz fine matzo meal 4 oz potato flour

Cream marg and sugar. Add egg and beat well. Add meal and potato flour and knead into a soft dough. ress mixture into 2 flan rings and mark each into 6 or 8 sections. Bake in pre-heated oven hegulo 5 or 375 F (190°C) for 30/40 minutes. Sprinkle with castor sugar and cut through whilst still hot.

SOVIET JEWRY

Several weeks ago some of the women of bushey United Shul and others gathered together to hear from two members of the 35's (women's Campaign for Boviet Jewry). They explained the plight of "refuseniks" and it was agreed that we should do what we could to help one such family.

It was suggested that people continue to write to the frestin family, but also that we begin working for boris Chernobilsky and his family in Moscow who are more recent refuseniks. Boris is 34 and is a qualified madio blectronics Engineer, his wife's name is Yelena and they have 2 girls, Anne aged 6 and Genya aged 3.

They first applied for a visa to go to Israel in 1976 (Spring) and were refused on the grounds of the "secrecy" of boris's work but no explanation of this has been received. Boris was arrested in October, 1976, when he and 52 other Jews went for explanations about wny their visas had been refused, together with another young family man losif As. worldwide protest backed up a defence committee set up in moscow and suddenly both men were released without being tried. The authorities claimed the young families of both men were the reason for the release, but it is thought that the protests here and in kussia were the real reason.

What we can do for these people to help them get their visas quickly is to write often to them so that the Soviet Authorities know that we are working for them. we must be aware if anything like an arrest occurs and act with telegrams and letters of protest; and we can do this for other refuseniks in Russia too.

The Chernobilsky's have two young children like many of us - they are worried about the lack of Jewish Education for their daughters and would appreciate books for them to read and learn from. If you have any or want to buy some, please get in touch with me and I shall explain how to send them. If you have a minute to spare, just get a picture postcard and send it to them greetings and best wishes and "how are you".

Seder

W7ラ (Recite Kiddush)

Usually each person who knows how, recites the Kiddush individually or in unison aloud. Those who wish can rely upon the Kiddush recited by the person conducting the Seder. If this is practiced, both the reader and listener must have in mind that the Kiddush shall be accredited to him (the listener) as if he himself recited it. To get such credit the listener must be silent during the recital of the Kiddush, pay attention to each word and answer "Amen" at the end of each Brocho. This procedure can be followed whenever a ברכה (blessing) is to be pronounced.

A year when the first Seder falls on Saturday night, an addition to the Kiddush, known as is said. The Kiddush and the additional Habdallah is found in every Haggadah.

After the Kiddush is pronounced, each one drinks the first cup of wine. Both male and female are required to drink at least more than half of the cup. The one conducting the Seder, and any male who wishes, drinks the wine reclining on left side.

דרחץ (Wash Hands Without Brocho)

Then all participants wash hands in the traditional manner (twice upon each hand with cup or glass which has no chip or crack) but the Brocho צל נסילת ידים is not pronounced. This is mandatory because we must wash our hands before eating a food dipped in liquid. No Brocho is recited because it does not precede the K'YIDA.

The person conducting the Seder distributes pieces of DDDD (vegetable) to all present. Each piece to be less than a nin (the size of an average green olive) to avoid the necessity for a short grace). The Karpas is בורא פרי dipped in salt water and the Brocho בורא is said. The full text of the Brocho is found in the Haggadah. When reciting the Brocho he is to have in mind that this Brocho shall also include and cover the Moror (bitter herbs) which he will eat later during the Seder.

m (Break the Middle Matzoh)

The person condcting the Seder then breaks the midde one of the 3 Matzohs into 2 unequal parts. He wraps the larger part in a cloth or napkin and places it between the pillows of his reclining seat or any other safe place for אסיקומן (Afikomon). The remaining part of the Matzoh he replaces to its former position.

Say the Hagadah

It is best that the one who conducts the Seder translates the Hagadah into a language that everyone understands. The purpose of reciting the Hagadah is to relate the story of, and the happenings leading to the exodus from Egypt. It is therefore obligitory to intersperse the Hebrew with explanations in English or any language the participants understand so that the narrative can take on its true significance.

The Matzos are uncovered and the "Ho Lachmo Anyo" is said. The cups are then filled the second time and the youngest asks the "four questions" The Hagadah is continued until "Go'al Yisroel" when the second cup of wine is drunk reclining to the left side.

Wash hands

Everyone washes their hands as in the manner described when we dip the vegetable in salt water. This time, however, we recite the blessing "al N'tilas Yodayim". One should not talk until after the next blessing.

The one reciting the Seder recites the "Motzei" over the two and a half Matzos on the Seder Dish. He then puts down the bottom Matzo, and over the upper and middle half Matzo recites the blessing "Al achilas matzo". He then breaks off two pieces, no less than the volume which when compressed is equal in size to half a medium egg (one ounce dry measure), "from the upper matzo together with no less than this volume from the middle, divided matzo. This is then eaten leaning on the left side. Those present also take similar quantities, recite the blessing and eat it, if men, reclining. In case there was not enough Matzo on the Seder plate then more should be used.

These two quantities of Matzo should be eaten in no more than 4-5 minutes.

*This measurement is called a "Kezayis" and from now on will be referred to as such

Ritter herbs

Take Bitter herbs no less than the size of a Kezavis, dip it into the Charoses (only dip, but do not eat the charoses together with the maror), recite the blessing "Al achilas maror". This is eaten without leaning and again within a period of 4-5 minutes.

Sandwich

Break the bottom matzo, put bitter herbs, the size of a Kezayis, between two pieces of matzo, also the size of a Kezayis, and say "Zecher Le'Mikdash Ke'Hillel". This is also dipped into the charoses and eaten leaning. Additional matzos should be used if the one is not enough.

The meal

One should avoid filling oneself at the meal in order to be able to eat a Kezayis of the Afikoman with relish.

After the meal is completed, Kezayis size pieces of the Afikoman are distributed and eaten leaning. Again, if there is insufficient Afikoman more can be added. Everyone participating in the Seder should eat the Afikoman. 772

Fill the third cup, and Grace after meals is said. After Grace after meals we recite the blessing over the wine and drink it reclining on the left side. Pour the Cup of Elijah open the doors onto the street and recite "She'foch Chamos'cho". After this paragraph we close the doors.

Fill the fourth cup of wine. Finish the Hallel and after reciting the blessing, drink reclining on the left side. It should be noted that while for the previous cups we were only obliged to drink over half of the cup, the last one has to be finished entirely.

If all the above order is followed then our service will be acceptable to G-d. We finish off with songs sung to their traditional tunes. After the Seder no food whatsoever should be eaten and no drink unless very weak e.g. water.


