THE PENITENTIAL SEASON



The Penitential Season in the Jewish year falls into four phases. From the New Moon of Ellul the Ram's horn is sounded in the Synagogue during the week-day morning services. Several days

the week-day morning services. Several days before New Year extra prayers known as "selichot" (prayers for pardon) are included in these morning services. The days between New Year and the Day of Atonement are known as "The Ten Days of Penitence" and finally the Penitential season culminates in the Day of Atonement.

The Day of Atonement has been referred to rather dubiously as "The Black Fast". Nothing could be further from the truth both literal and metaphorical. The Cantor, and in some places the Congregation, don the traditional flowing white robes (kittel), the Synagogue desks and the Ark are draped in white, and every available light is turned on. It is an occasion of solemn and sober job, a reflection of the Jew's confidence that his Maker will not reject "a humble and a contrite heart".

THE FEAST OF TABERNACLES



The Feast of Tabernacles celebrates the fruit harvest in Israel. The ancient Jewish farmer would often travel far from home during the harvest and live in some temporary abode in the vicinity of the orchards.


Hence the custom of erecting a tabernacle or booth to celebrate the fruit harvest festival. In tradition, The Feast of Tabernacles commemorates the days of wandering in the wilderness when the ancient Israelites lived in booths which were easily erected and dismantled. From a religious point of view the festival is meant to contrast the permanence and security of the house with the flimsy and temporary structure of the Sukkah. By reflecting on this contrast we are meant to think of the ephemeral nature of the material aspect of life and to concentrate on matters of deeper spiritual significance. Other symobls connected with the festival are the Lulav and the Ethrog.

THE SEASON OF THE REJOICING TO OF OUR LAW



The last two days
of the Feast of
Tabernacles
constitute a separate
festival. The
eighth day is known
as Shemini Atzeret

or the Eighth Day of Holy Convocation and the last day as Simchat Torah, which celebrates the conclusion of the reading of the Law. In the Synagogue the readings come from the end of Deuteronomy and the beginning of Genesis. All the Scrolls of the Law are carried round the Synagogue seven times and it is an occasion for much rejoicing.

Two Prayers Explained.

OON-SANE TOIKEF describing in exalted language the heavenly procedure on the day of judgment, is said to have been published by Rabbi Kalonymus ben Meshullam of Mayence, one of the most eminent payyetanim of the eleventh century. This stirring poem has been the subject of a popular story, the oldest mention of which is found in the thirteenth century work Or Zaru'a by Rabbi Isaac of Vienna. The story runs as follows:-

Rabbi Amnon, a wealthy scholar of noble descent, was repeatedly but fruitlessly pressed by the rulers of Mayence to change his faith. On one occasion he evasively asked to be given three days in which to consider the matter.

Upon reaching home he would neither eathor drink; he was sad at heart and wept bitterly because he had given the impression that he might renounce his belief in one God. When, at the end of the three days, he failed to appear before the tyrants, he was arrested and compelled to plead guilty.

As a punishment, his hands and feet were cut off.

On New Year's Day, Rabbi Amnon was brought to the Synagogue at his own request. When the Chazan was about to recite the Kedushah, Rabbi Amnon asked him to pause. Dying from his wounds, Rabbi Amnon then recited the prayer-poem which had come to him by inspiration. No sooner than he had finished the prayer when he died.

Three days later he appeared to Kaobi Kalonymus ben Meshullam in a dream and taught him this prayer to be introduced to all congregations.

KOL NIDRE the Aramaic formula for the dispensation of vows, is more than a thousand years old. It refers to vows assumed by an individual for himself alone, where no other persons or their interests are involved. Though the context makes it perfectly obvious that no vows or obligations toward others are implied, there have been many who were misled into believing that by means of this formula all their vows and oaths

century, Rabbi Meir ben Samuel (Rash's son-in-law) changed the original wording of Kol Nidre so do to make it apply to the future instead of the past, that is, to vows one might not be able to fulfil during the next year. Support for his emendation was provided by a talmudic statement which reads: "Whoever desires that none of his vows made during the year shall be valid, let him declare at the beginning of the year: May all the vows which I am likely to make in the future be annulled".

On account of its great solemnity, Yom Kippur was chosen for the recital of Kol Nidre, though the Talmud mentions Rosh Hashanah in this connection. The Hebrew version of Kol Nidre, found in the ninth century Siddur of Amram Gaon, still contains the original reference to vows contracted in the course of the year that has passed. This will partly explain the confusion in many a translation of this passage in the Mahsor.

Kol Nidre is chanted 3 times so that latecomers may hear it. According to Mahzor Vitry, the Chazan chants Kol Nidre very softly the first time, like one who hesitates to enter the king's palace and fears to come near him with a request for a favour; the second time he chants somewhat louder, the third time he raises his voice louder and louder, like one who is accustomed to being a member of the king's court. Kol Nidre is chanted before sunset because dispensation from a vow may not be granted on Sabbath or on a festival.

The law regarding vows is plainly stated in the Torah: "When you make any vow to the Lord your God, you must pay it without delay....If you refrain from making a vow, that is no sin for you; but you must be careful to perform any promise you have made with your lips."
(Deuteronomy 23:22-24). Since one runs the risk of either breaking or delaying to fulfil the vows he makes, we are frequently advised to refrain from rash vows even if they are motivated by pious devotion.

Mol Nidre acquired intense significance particularly during the period of persecutions in Spain, where some hundred thousand Jews were forced to forswear their faith and adopt a new religion. Many of these attended the synagogue in secret at the risk of their life and used the Kol Nidre text as a form of renouncing the vows imposed upon them by the

Inquisition. At the beginning of the sixteenth century, a Chazan in Germany composed the stirring tune which expresses fear, impassioned pleading and hope for ultimate deliverance. This plaintive and touching melody, adopted by the Ashkenazim throughout the world, is not used by Sephardic and oriental Jews who recite Kol Nidre in the manner of a simple prayer.

BUSHEY BNEI AKIVAH

This is the season to ring out the old, or more aptly, blow in the new. In keeping with the Jewish tradition, a new Tochnit for BBA is about to commence.

Having no other similar Jewish youth group in the area, it is difficult to put into perspective exactly how successful BBA was in its first few months. But, have no fear, we are here to stay, and our impact on both Bushey and Bnei Akiva was such that the full extent of the damage has still to be uncovered!

In the 12 meetings we enjoyed an immense variety of games, songs and dances; the themes ranging from "To be a Jew" to "The Iraeli Army" and "The Effects of Fasting" to "A Day in the Life of a Kibbutznik".

Old favourites were called for each week such as "fruit baskets" and 'Goosey, Goosey" (a la Bushey), and the weekly discussion from the older group on sedras and other areas of Jewish concern proved very fruitful. There were numerous quizes and plays, much fun and a few tears. Literally hundreds of ideas suggested by chaverim and madrichim were tried and tested; we learnt a great deal, and all this points to the renewal of a great B.A. group.

But this is not just a 2 hour per week group (Shabbat, 3 p.m.-5 p.m.). We had three major outings, each a great success.

On one of the few sunny days, some thirty-five of us spent an afternoon in a local park on a scavenger hunt and both the madrichim and the park-keeper were amazed at how highly the chaverim scored.

A few weeks later ten members of the older group were invited to stay over Shabbat as guests of Edgware Bnei Akiva. You only have to ask those who went to discover how much we all enjoyed it. - Thanks again to Edgware B.A.

Just prior to the summer break, we had an outing to Knebworth House and adventure playground. Although not supported as well as we had expected, those who went returned, at the end of a very busy day, exhausted but happy. Our thanks to Jeffrey Blumenfeld, who made a good day a great one.

Finally, I would like to thank all those who have made BBA what it is. The parents who have helped with planning and transport, and especially the chaverim for their support.

HOLGAISE



Hitler and his Nazi thugs used the concentration camps to inspire terror in the German people. As the Germans subjected Europe to their tyranny more and more camps were set up Their inmates - the Jews. Gypsies and anyone classed as 'undesirable' Amid all this bestiality six names stand out: the extermination camps which sys tematically dered 8,000,000 in a little more than three years

If all the signs were there, why didn't the Jews escape?

Tens of thousands of Jews did try to escape, but it was really the old problem. Where could they go? Almost any country you could care to name maintained a strict quota policy for the admission of Jewish refugees from Europe. Perhaps the situation was best summed up by the Australian delegate at the Evian Conference of 1938 (called to discuss the problem) when he said: 'It will no doubt be appreciated that as we have no racial problem, we are not desirous of importing one'. Britain was moderately responsive to the plight of Europe's Jews and accepted 65,000 refugees. America took in 190,000 but imposed strict quotas after 1941. Strangely enough, Nationalist China accepted more Jews - mainly into Shanghar than were accepted by Canada, Australia, New Zealand and India combined.

Of course, Palestine would have been the obvious refuge, but the restrictions on immigration slammed that door shut. But nevertheless about 120,000 Jews were able to get to the 'Promised Land'. And as a total figure, about 800,000 Jews did manage to escape the Nazis – a figure equivalent to one-in-seven of those who perished.

'In a world where humans are free to do right and to do wrong there will always be evil actions. If the Holocaust is to teach us anything it must be the realisation that one has to speak out against evil. Even a limited, uncertain, anguished fight against the darkness is better than surrendering to the evils of the past and the present day'.

Did the Holocaust really happen? Yes. That is the simple an wer. The proof is in the toll of human life. For, according to the most accurate estimates, some 5,900,000 Jewsperished during the Holocaust - the vast majority killed by the Nazis, others by disease and a campaign of forced starvation Of this total figure, about 5 million victims died in the concentration camps, in mass executions and in the thousands of 'Aktionen' carried out by the Nazis and their henchmen in Poland, the Baltic States, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Rumania, and German occupied Russia. The remainder perished in Holland, Norway, Belgium, France, Luxernbourg, Italy, Yugosinvia, Greece and Germany

The number represents about one third of all the Jews who were alive and half of all those living in Europe.

In recent years there has been a mounting campaign throughout the world to prove the Holocaust to be a hoax, a big Jewish lie. It would have been an easy matter to discredit this propaganda, had exact records of the Holocaust existed, however the the detailed files once kept in Adolf.

Holocaust existed, however the the detailed files once kept in Adolf Eichmann's office were destroyed But a painful computation has been made by careful area by area analysis of the losses. In some cases, such as mass deportations to the extermination camps from Wissern Europe, detailed records were found. It was only in the assessments for Poland and Russia that any difficulties arose, because of the massive number involved and the cross-border migrations between these two countries. The final figure of just under 6 million is, indeed, on the conservative side.

But, are the scars and the testimony of the survivors insufficient evidence?

then? Recently, the author and

Whatever one felt about the presentation of the TV film "Holocaust" the facts spoke for themselves. The horror and brutality can never be wholly imagined by those of us fortunate not to have been there.

How frightening it is then to hear of refuseniks in Russia comparing those early days in Germany with their situation now.

Anti-semitism is part and parcel of everyday life. Young Jews are being denied places in higher education and people are taunted everywhere they turn.

Amidst this news the 35's have, with many other individuals, launched their campaign to have the 1980 Olympics removed from Moscow. Their argument counters the view that this will be an ideal opportunity for the world to meet refuseniks and to see their situation. They are convinced by the view of Russian Jews who fear greatly that by 1980 Moscow will be cleared of all Jewish and human rights activists.

When American statesmen have visited the USSR people have conveniently been imprisoned for several days. This time they believe the authorities will see that people they do not want to demonstrate or meet Western journalists will be far away from Moscow. The recent trials and sentences of Sharansky, Begun, Slepak and Ida Nudel, have begun this task. The Soviet authorities hope that by 1980 these names and many others will be forgotten. It is imperative that we do not allow this to happen. We must write continually to these people so that they do not disappear.

What has happened and is happening with our synagogue? Nine years ago the known Jewish residents were circularised and invited to a meeting just before the New Year at which, at present, has become our place of worship. It became known that the building had been purchased and it was to become a synagogue affiliated to the United Synagogue.

Talk and discussion took place and then and there it was agreed that one of the first priorities was to get the place cleaned up in order to hold the forthcoming services. A number of us got together and cleaned and scrubbed the building in preparation for the High Holydays.

What have we attained since then? Apart from a coat of paint and some other necessities - nothing.

As one who attends the services fairly regularly I have opportunity to observe and what is there to be seen - black cobwebs that have been there at least 6 or 7 years, dirty windows, curtains covered in dust(they have hardly, if ever, been brushed since they were hung).

I appreciate that a fair amount of money has been used for the Beth Hamedrash and I accept this priority but what happens when most of these children attending the classes grow up and move away; are their parents and grand-parents to be left with the dowdy building that we now have? Money does not have to be spent on a great rebuilding plan, or refurnishing operation, but at least the place could be made clean.

What can be done about the decorum? I admit that at times I am a party to ill manners talking during the

service but in recent months the Shabbat service has been getting steadily worse. There are those who do come for a spiritual uplift but how can you relate to your Maker when the discipline amongst some members is negligible?

I dread to think what is going to happen during the coming Yomtovim, the hall is small, the congregation getting larger and it seems uncontrollable. I would like to hope that during our forthcoming services, members will try and concentrate on the davening and show some respect to those good enough to lead us in our prayers and that the members don't treat these services as a morning coffee clutch.

Some months ago it was explained to us by Mr. Johnny Back that whenever the priests stood in front of the Ark and prayed it was not necessary for the congregants to turn and stand with their backs towards them. This was a superstition that was possible to dispense with. Well, what about Yizkor? It is absolutely stupid for the mass exodus of those who, thank G-d, have parents alive, to act as though their coat tails are alight with the very devil after them and wish to get out quickly. It is quite in order that those not taking part should remain quietly seated (what a hope) and listen to the beautiful prayer that is recited for the departed. But, no, everyone congregates in the street chattering and shouting not only disturbing those praying but the local residents. people are alien to our way of life and it must, I am sure, cause a great deal of dislike and irritation towards us as Jews. Wouldn't it be possible for us to respect these people also.

I am not personalising this complaint but I would like to think that we all look at ourselves and ask is it possible that I, or we, or us, will make the forthcoming services appreciated. If there are those amongst us who cannot read Hebrew, let us read the English translation and we will know why we have come to attend the service and what it is about.



...I AM HAPPY THAT I CAN BE A WITNESS TO THE REDEMPTION OF THE JEWS IN THE U.S.S.R.

In March and April 1977, during the preliminary interrogations, those conducting the investigation warned me that, in view of the position taken by me during the investigation, the one which I have maintained during the course of this trial. I will be likely to be given the death sentence or, as a minimum, 15 years of confinement. I was told that if I agreed to collaborate with the KGB in order to destroy the Jewish emigration movement, then I would be given a short sentence, quick release, and even the possibility of joining my wife.

Five years ago I applied for a visa to Israel, but now I am further than ever away from the attainment of my dream. It might appear that I must have regrets about what has happened But this is not so. I am happy. I am happy that I have lived honestly, in peace with my conscience, and have never betrayed my soul, even when I was threatened with death. I am happy that I have helped people. I am proud to have known and worked with such honourable brave people as Sakharov, Orlov, Ginsburg, they who are continuing the finest traditions of the Russian intellectuals

am happy that I can be a witness to the redemption of the Jews in the I am happy that I can be a witness to the redemption of the Jews in the USSR. These absurd accusations against me and against the whole Jewish emigration movement will not hinder the liberation of my people. My relatives and friends know how very much I wanted to exchange the life of an activist of the Jewish emigration movement here for a life in Israel with my Avital. For more than two thousand years my people have been scattered throughout the Disspora, but wherever Jews were they have repeated each year. 'Next Year in Jerusalem — LeShana haba's b'Yerushalayim.' Now that I am further than ever away from my people and from my Avital, and I am expecting many hard long years of confinement, I say again, speaking to my people and to my Avital: 'LeShana haba's b'Yerushalayim—Next Year in Jerusalem.'
