Hull Hebrew Congregation Trustee's Report

The Trustees present their Report and the Accounts of the Congregation for the year ended 31st December, 2014.

1. Trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees' are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue to provide for the advancement of the Jewish Religion.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

2. Legal and administrative details

The Charity (Reg. No. 1035451) operates by the guidelines of its constitution adopted in 1994 as amended in 2006, together with the new Charity name of Hull Hebrew Congregation.

The Charity is run by a Council consisting of 18 elected Trustees.

Finances of the Charity are administered by the Hon. Treasurer who reports to the Council regularly giving a full description of the Charity's financial position.

The Hull Hebrew Congregation was constituted in 1994 with the amalgamation of the Hull Old Hebrew Congregation, Hull Western Synagogue and the Hull Judeans Maccabi Association and has operated in accordance with its stated objects of the advancement of the Jewish Religion in Hull and the surrounding area, to provide for youth in its area and to advance the education of the public in particular with regard to Judaism and the Jewish Faith and Hebrew Language.

When planning our activities for the year the trustees have considered the Commission's guidance on public benefit, and in particular the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion.

4. Review of the year

A summary of the financial activities for the year ended 31st December, 2014 provided in further detail with comparative results on page 6 is as follows:

The total income of \pounds 73,771 was generated from: donations and gifts \pounds 7,674; contributions from members \pounds 57,024; investment income \pounds 313; other income \pounds 6,710 and legacies of \pounds 2,050.

Charitable expenditure amounting to £125,334 comprised of provision of charitable services £123,219, fundraising and publicity £1,651 and governance costs of £464.

Of the net deficit of £51,563 a deficit of £66,889 is transferred to accumulated fund and a surplus of £15,326 is transferred to restricted reserves.

Jonathan Levine was elected President at the Annual General meeting held on 15th June 2014.

It was a great honour to be elected President by the Congregation for a fifth and final year at the Annual General Meeting.

We continue where we left off last year with the Congregation on a high with the Rabbi and his wonderful family.

The minyanim have continued to increase on both Friday nights and Shabbat mornings. We have had several new members join the Shul. The Rabbi has continued with his shuirim on a Saturday evening which are proving popular.

We are having a chollent lunch once a month and have had Malava Malkas for both the community and the gentlemen who attend the shuir. Also during the year we have had communal Friday night meals not to mention the regular Friday night chicken soup meals and the Sunday morning breakfasts.

A highlight of the year was the visit of the new Chief Rabbi, Ephraim Mirvis who came to induct Rabbi Lifschitz. The Shul was packed and all members had the opportunity of speaking with the Chief Rabbi.

Another highlight was the Masonic Annual Provincial Service which we hosted for the first time. Although we had to restrict members who were able to attend due to a large turnout, all who attended were very impressed by our Synagogue and the Rabbis address.

The Yomim Noraim this year were conducted by Simon Caplan who served the congregation as Baal Musaph for the third time. He came back with his wife and boys and they all feel like part of the community. We have asked him back for next year and can I offer him our grateful thanks.

Our gentlemen assisted and supported as always and the Yom Tov days passed with great dignity and enjoyment for those who attended. The Mitzvah of Chosan Torah and Chosan Bereshis this year was given to Harry Lanch together with Cyril Brown. As senior members of our congregation

The Ladies Guild jointly led by Laurette Pearlman and Debbie Levine has provided Shabbat kiddushim throughout the year and events at Chanukah and Purim. Their excellent catering and parties are an important part of our communitys social life and we are sure that everyone joins me in expressing my thanks to them and the ladies that help.

Sunday morning breakfasts are a focal point for the gentlemen and give the preceding shacharis services enhanced meaning. Many thanks to Sharon Dysch, Laura Gold, Anna Grantham and Lynda Levy who prepare the beigels. Also to the Rabbi's children who help them.

An important event in our Shul calendar is the AJEX Annual Remembrance service. It is with great pride that we continue to support our ex service men and women, ably led by Perris Coupland together with Cyril Brown, in welcoming civic and parliamentary dignitaries to our Shul to honour the community's fallen of the two great wars. This year Rabbi Lifschitz led the service with the help of Philip Daniels. The Rabbi's address was appreciated by all who attended.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to all those gentleman who have assisted in conducting services during the course of the year. In particular the wardens Ian Dysch, Max Gold, Howard Levy and Anthony Rowland. I am also indebted to Conrad Segelman and others for leading services and performing Haftorah. A special thank you to Max Gold for regular davening and leading services both on Shabbat and weekdays whenever required. This year we lost a former President and Warden Judah Rose. I know I am not alone in missing his knowledge and advice.

Can I express my most earnest thanks to David Lewis for all the Bikur Cholim work he does visiting patients in hospital, nursing homes and at home.

The work of our Chevra Kadisha goes on with great efficiency and sensitivity and our discreet words of appreciation and thanks seem hardly adequate.

I would like to take this opportunity in mentioning the activity of the communal archive committee with its continued research and regular informative events. David Lewis this year was officially appointed Archivist for the Shul and I would like to thank him for all his dedicated work.

Secular organisations and many schools continue to visit our Shul, the latter in conjunction with the national curriculum religious education syllabus. We are most grateful to Laurette and Sharon for all the hard work they do in this regard. Also can I thank Michael Westerman for the Jewish teaching he does in the wider community.

I must thank my wife for her support and express my gratitude and thanks to my Executive for all their hard work and assistance and to the Council and Wardens for all their support and advice.

I conclude by again thanking the Rabbi and his family for enhancing our community. Although we are small in number his improvements have brought out the best in all of us. I don't know of another community where the welcome is as warm and hospitable as ours.

I also want to thank Laurette and Edward Pearlman for their many years of dedicated service to our community in many roles and to wish them and their family well as they start a new life in Israel.

This is my final report as President and I want to thank the Congregation for supporting me. There have been a few issues along the way especially the transition from one Rabbi to another but with great help these have been overcome. My highlights are many but in particular the visits of two Chief Rabbis in a short space of time.

1. Accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2006 and applicable UK accounting standards.

a) Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

b) Voluntary income

Cash donations, gifts and legacies are included in full in the income and expenditure account as they are received. Significant non cash donations are included in the income and expenditure account at the Council's estimate of their market value when received. The value of voluntary help is not included in the accounts.

c) Other operating income

All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

d) Investment income

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on receipt. Dividends are included in the income and expenditure account when they are received, at an amount which includes the tax credit recoverable from the Inland Revenue.

e) Depreciation

Depreciation on assets is calculated on the straight line method and aims to write down the cost or valuation of all fixed assets over their expected useful lives.

The rates generally applicable are:

Motor vehicles	25%
Fixtures and fittings	5%

f) Designated funds

Designated funds are authorised by the Council to be set aside from unrestricted funds for future expenditure commitments.

g) Expenditure

This is accounted for on an accruals basis. Where expenditure is incurred which relates to more than one cost category, the expenditure is apportioned over all relevant headings.

i) Administration

Administration includes the cost of management of the Charity's affairs.

ii) Fundraising

Fundraising includes the costs of raising the Charity's gifted income.

iii) Publicity

Publicity includes the cost of raising public awareness to the Charity's objectives.

h) Legacies and donations

Legacies and donated income are accounted for upon notification to the Council.

2. Taxation

The association is a U.K. registered charity, number 1035451. All the association's income is applied to its charitable objectives and the association is, therefore, exempt under current legislation from most forms of taxation.
