# Hull Hebrew Congregation Trustee's Report

The Trustees present their Report and the Accounts of the Congregation for the year ended 31st December, 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective January 2015).

### 1. Trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees' are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue to provide for the advancement of the Jewish Religion.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

### 2. Legal and administrative details

The Charity (Reg. No. 1035451) operates by the guidelines of its constitution adopted in 1994 as amended in 2006, together with the new Charity name of Hull Hebrew Congregation.

The Charity is run by a Council consisting of 13 elected Trustees.

Finances of the Charity are administered by the Hon. Treasurer who reports to the Council regularly giving a full description of the Charity's financial position.

The Hull Hebrew Congregation was constituted in 1994 with the amalgamation of the Hull Old Hebrew Congregation, Hull Western Synagogue and the Hull Judeans Maccabi Association and has operated in accordance with its stated objects of the advancement of the Jewish Religion in Hull and the surrounding area, to provide for youth in its area and to advance the education of the public in particular with regard to Judaism and the Jewish Faith and Hebrew Language.

When planning our activities for the year the trustees have considered the Commission's guidance on public benefit, and in particular the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion.

### 4. Review of the year

A summary of the financial activities for the year ended 31st December, 2018 provided in further detail with comparative results on page 6 is as follows:

The total income of £120,249 was generated from: donations and gifts £10,241; contributions from members £52,679 investment income £62; other income £4,291 and legacies of £52,976.

Charitable expenditure amounting to £112,815 comprised of provision of charitable services £111,104 and fundraising and publicity £1,711.

Of the surplus of  $\pounds$ 7,434 the deficit transfer to accumulated fund amounted to  $\pounds$ 61,429 and a surplus of  $\pounds$ 68,863 to restricted reserves.

At the AGM 1st July 2018 Howard Levy President and Warden; Dr David Lewis Vice President; Sharon Dysch Secretary; and Ian Dysch Warden and Chairman of the Chevrah Kadisha stood down and we thanked them for their many years of collective service to our congregation and community. In particular Howard, Sharon and Ian stood aside because of their plans to leave Hull and join their families and friends in different cities and we wish them good health and much mazel in that pursuit. In the absence of candidates for the positions of President and Vice President of the Council Philip Daniels Chairman of the Custodial Trustees was elected as acting Chair of a temporary Management Committee/Council along with Avril Sugarman as acting Vice Chair. Leslie Sugarman was again elected as Treasurer and David Lewis as Secretary. We also welcomed Leslie Gold, Harold Flasher, Vic Golding and Ron Stone as part of the temporary management committee /Council structure.

Early in 2018 informal talks were initiated with the United Synagogue regarding the benefits of the HCC joining the US community of Synagogues. Their David Kaplan attended an informal general meeting of the congregation for information on February 5th. A further general meeting for information was held September 3rd when the US CEO Steven Wilson accompanied by the US Vice President Leonie Lewis attended and answered questions on the many issues that would be involved in such a merger. At time of writing (May 2019) the congregation has taken the decision to join the US at its special general meeting on 3rd February 2019 and the matter is now being progressed through our respective solicitors.

The rebuilding of the Marfleet Cemetery Prayer Hall was completed in February 2018 following which the Hall was opened by Chief Rabbi Mirvis on April 29th and dedicated to the blessed memory the late Max Gold. Max was a central pillar of our congregation and the wider community. Max is sadly missed. We are very grateful to Lady Beryl Steinberg for her generosity to the project in blessed memory of her late parents Elsie and Mony Cobden. Following the dedication the Chief Rabbi addressed congregants at Pryme Street and a buffet was enjoyed by all. Without the eight years of hard dedicated work by Edward Perlman and Jonathan Levine this project would never have come to fruition. We are thankful for all the work Jonathan and Edward did in this respect and in many other aspects of Synagogue life before moving to Israel and London respectively to be nearer their families.

We enjoyed an uplifting Communal Seder under the ministry of Rabbi Naftoli Lifschitz when we were grateful for the hard work of Rebbetzin Sheyna for the beautifully prepared Seder table and meal.

The Yomim Noraim was ably conducted by Rabbi Naftoli with Simon Caplan giving us great joy with his Chazanut. We wished mazel tov to Les Sugarman and Edward Blank with their families who undertook the mitzvah of Chatan Torah and Chatan Bereishit when we all enjoyed a lovely Succah and Simcha. We were grateful to Henry Grantham, Rikki Klarik, Les Sugarman, David Lewis assisted by others for their hard work assembling the Succah.

We were deeply saddened by the decision of Rabbi Naftoli, Rebbetzin Sheyna and family to leave us for the Newton Mearns Congregation in Glasgow. Rabbi Naftoli supported by Sheyna and family have been a great support for us here at Pryme Street in the six years he served as Communal Rabbi. Rabbi Naftolis leadership has been inspiring and he breathed new life into the community after years of decline. We are grateful to the Lifschitz family and wish them well in Glasgow.

At time of writing we are grateful for the assistance of Rabbi Eli Denderowicz and Rebbetzin Sorrela supported by their lovely family who are standing in whilst a new rabbinic appointment is made. The hard work of the Ladies Committee should never be taken for granted and we were delighted that Avril Sugarman and Anna Grantham were again elected as Joint Chair of their committee. Every Shabbat our ladies prepare a lovely Kiddush and there are many special Kiddushim and Simchas; Sunday morning Shacharit bagel breakfasts; Chanukah; Purim; Shabbat Suedahs, Cholent lunches, Friday night chicken soup assisted by our Rebbetzin; and the many other events which have to be catered where the work involved is very demanding and time consuming. A simple thank you to all of our ladies seems hardly enough.

The Annual AJEX Remembrance Service was this year organized by Michael Westerman President of the Hull Representative Council and his team in conjunction with the members of Hull AJEX. We again welcomed members of the Civic and wider Community besides our own to Pryme Street to enjoy what is always an uplifting but thought provoking time of remembrance.

Our sincere thanks to all the gentlemen who have assisted the Rabbi in the conduct of Divine services during the year in particular our Wardens Howard Levy, Ian Dysch, Leslie Sugarman and Rikki Klarik. Thanks to Conrad Segelman, David Lewis and Rikki Klarik for their many Haftarah's.

Ian Dysch handed over the responsibility of Chairman of the Chevrah Kadisha to Philip Daniels at the AGM and we thanked Ian for his years of dedicated work. Harold Flasher agreed to take responsibility as the day time contact for the Chevrah Kadisha. Our discreet words of appreciation and thanks to all the team that continue to give service especially with respect to Taharah are heartfelt.

Many thanks to Michael Westerman, Sharon and Ian Dysch, Avril Sugarman and Laura Gold for talking to visiting school children at the synagogue and at their schools about Judaism.

We are pleased that the 'Friendly Circle' continued to support the HHC by meeting at Pryme Street and for the other charitable organizations including 'WIZO' and 'MDA' who did likewise during the year and utilized our extensive facilities. We are pleased the Judeans Maccabi table tennis team continues to meet in our Pryme Street Community Center.

A huge thank you is due to Rabbi Naftoli and his family for enhancing our community and to Rabbi Eli for picking up where Rabbi Naftoli abruptly left off in November. It has to be said that we currently face a great challenge in maintaining Divine services at every level. Whilst Friday night services are well supported our Shabbat Minyan are on a knife edge with services not starting until 10.00am on some occasions. We have almost given up on Shabbat Ma'ariv and Sunday mornings are rarely recently able to properly proceed because of lack of a Minyan. Monday and Thursday evening Minch and Ma'ariv are variably supported. Unless we maintain Minyan we will lose the will and reason for carrying on. No Rabbi and family will wish to travel to Hull if we do not adequately support Divine services. It is time for every one of us to look in the mirror and ask ourselves do we want the orthodox congregation to survive and what are we prepared to do to support it? The issue is as stark as 'use it or lose it'.

### 1. Accounting policies

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015), and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

### a) Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

### b) Voluntary income

Cash donations, gifts and legacies are included in full in the income and expenditure account as they are received. Significant non cash donations are included in the income and expenditure account at the Council's estimate of their market value when received. The value of voluntary help is not included in the accounts.

### c) Other operating income

All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

### d) Investment income

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on receipt. Dividends are included in the income and expenditure account when they are received, at an amount which includes the tax credit recoverable from the Inland Revenue.

### e) Depreciation

Depreciation on assets is calculated on the straight line method and aims to write down the cost or valuation of all fixed assets over their expected useful lives.

The rates generally applicable are:

Freehold properties	1.25%
Motor vehicles	25%
Fixtures and fittings	5%

### f) Designated funds

Designated funds are authorised by the Council to be set aside from unrestricted funds for future expenditure commitments.

### g) Expenditure

This is accounted for on an accruals basis. Where expenditure is incurred which relates to more than one cost category, the expenditure is apportioned over all relevant headings.

i) Administration

Administration includes the cost of management of the Charity's affairs.

ii) Fundraising

Fundraising includes the costs of raising the Charity's gifted income.

iii) Publicity

Publicity includes the cost of raising public awareness to the Charity's objectives.

### h) Legacies and donations

Legacies and donated income are accounted for upon notification to the Council.

### 2. Taxation

The association is a U.K. registered charity, number 1035451. All the association's income is applied to its charitable objectives and the association is, therefore, exempt under current legislation from most forms of taxation.
