At the end of the ceremony, the president held a reception for members of the council and executives of neighbouring synagogues. A presentation was made to Rabbi Kyanski.

Rabbi Rabinowitz is only 25 years of age and he has been accepted for enlistment into an anti-aircraft unit for the defence of Tyneside—the first Rabbi in this country to serve in such a capacity. When he applied for enlistment he was told he was eligible for a commission as a chaplain but he declined to accept it and told the commanding officer that he wanted to serve as an ordinary "Tommy."

"I am anxious to play my part in the defence of this county," Rabbi Rabinowitz told an "Evening Chronicle" representative to-day. "I have no wish to serve as an officer and have arranged to enlist this week as a prive soldier in a Newcastle anti-aircraft unit.

All clergymen are legally exempt from joining any of the fighting services even under conscription. There were cases during the Great War when clerymen, rather than be commissioned as padres, took ordinary commissions or joined the ranks, but as far as is known there is no case on record of a Rabbi becoming a fighting soldier.
