# Report of the Trustees For the year ended 31 March 2016

The trustee presents his report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2016.

#### Structure, governance and management

Ealing Liberal Synagogue (ELS) is governed by its Constitution & Rules as approved at an AGM on 25 October 2015. Its property and affairs are under the governance and control of a Council. The Council consists of a President, 2 Vice Presidents, ex officio the Minister (Rabbi), the Chair and 9 ordinary members. The Council has the power to appoint the Minister and other employees, notably the Administrator. The Council appoints 3 Holding Trustees. ELS is affiliated to Liberal Judaism.

#### **Objectives**

In summary these are:

- a) The advancement of Liberal Judaism;
- b) Provision of religious services;
- c) Provision of place of worship;
- d) Provision of services and classes for children;
- e) Arranging for burial and cremation of members;
- f) Enabling solemnisation of marriages;
- g) Performing other religious, communal, charitable duties including a Memorial Welfare Fund;
- h) Carrying out other things conducive to the above.

#### Achievements and performance

The fall in full membership of 16 was largely due to the demise of many of our most elderly members. However membership has now stabilised. We are attracting more members in their thirties and some single older members and we are considering what changes in our activities might suit them best.

#### Services

We continue to hold religious services on all Friday evenings and once a month on Saturdays. All major festivals were celebrated and most minor ones, though these latter were often marked on the nearest Shabbat rather than on the precise Hebrew date. We continue to attract many unaffiliated local Jews to our High Holy Days services and Chanukkah festivities, but very few seem willing to make an ongoing commitment to synagogue-based community life.

The tisch (Erev Shabbat suppers) continues to be our best attended service event, which also gives our Rabbi the opportunity to care for single members, particularly widows and widowers who have no one with whom to share a Shabbat meal.

# Report of the Trustees For the year ended 31 March 2016

#### **Religion School**

The ELS Religion School (cheder) provided Hebrew and Jewish studies tuition from reception age until approximately School Year 8. Our Rabbi functioned as the Headteacher, selecting our curriculum materials and teaching the b'nei mitzvah class. She was supported by one other adult member of staff, Mimi Nakar. The remainder of the staff were drawn from our post b'nei mitzvah students. We encouraged all students to participate in Liberal Judaism's youth movement, LJY Netzer, as one of the most important factors in maintaining a strong Jewish identity is contact with enthusiastic Jewish peers.

The number of children enrolled in the Religion School in 2015/16 was 13, with one student being tutored privately by our Rabbi. We ended the academic year with 12 pupils, plus one who attends informally about once a month. We hope that two prospective families with children will join before the High Holy Days and make a commitment so that our number heading into autumn 2016 will be 14.

#### Social/Welfare

Regular activities included coffee mornings for younger and senior members and a book club, bridge, and Israeli dancing. Annual events taking place included a barbecue at a member's home, and a 'chanukah' tea for elderly members. Hospital and home visits were made. We have a scheme for regular telephone contacts with members who wish this. The annual charity evening to collect funds for outside charities was held in the summer raising £820. The Memorial Welfare Fund contributed £2,295 to ELS.

#### **ELS Premises**

Work has now been completed on refurbishing the hall, kitchen, toilets the sanctuary and the administration office. The new tenant CMN shared some of the costs. New furniture has been acquired to enhance the comfort of the sanctuary and to allow for expanded activities. The sanctuary now has its own staff toilet facilities and a small kitchen. Improved LED lighting has been installed throughout the building. Besides general improvements to the car park the opportunity was taken to create a small Holocaust Memorial Garden at its extremity. An automatic watering system will soon be laid on.

#### Health & Safety/Maintenance

The annual gas safety, fire extinguisher and portable electrical equipment checks were carried out in addition to routine maintenance. Fire alarms and an emergency lighting system were installed in 2015/16 and a service contract put in place.

#### Security

New metal gates for our car park entrance have been installed. We have been fortunate to have received a grant from CST to provide a contracted security guard at our main events. Together with the participation of parents on the security rota this has enhanced our ability to effectively control the access into the Synagogue during these uncertain times.

#### Lettings

The negotiations with Creative Minds Nurseries were successfully completed and a Montessori nursery school was opened in September 2015 in the main hall. As anticipated, this 10 year rental contract has already yielded a substantial increase in our lettings income and with yearly rent reviews this will grow further. The sanctuary is also yielding a rental income from a private individual running a Yoga class on Tuesday evenings.

#### **General Administration**

Our administrator has coped exceptionally well with the added burden of dealing with builders and other trades people involved with the Synagogue refurbishments. She also very ably carried out her regular work involving minor maintenance, cleaning, printing, postage and the constant updating of the books of account. As Secretary to the Trustees she attended out-of-hours meetings and assisted Council members in their various roles.

#### Communication

We presently publish a bimonthly magazine Shalom and a monthly e-bulletin. Consideration has been given this year to exploring ways of promoting the activities and attractions of the Synagogue especially to young adults in a concerted drive to recruit new members. As a first step we have engaged an outside company to advise us and help us develop our ideas. We hope the fruits of our joint labours will be apparent in the coming year. A new logo has been designed and a new website, based on the logo, will be set up to be ready by mid September. We will also ensure that our new logo appears on all email and paper communications. It is likely that the monthly e-bulletin will become the main form of communication with members and Shalom may be replaced by an annual magazine produced for the High Holy Days.

#### Liberal Judaism

ELS are affiliated to Liberal Judaism (LJ) which has 35 communities in the UK and Eire. Members attended LJ seminars.

#### Interfaith

Other faith groups were welcomed to the synagogue during the year.

#### Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's objectives and activities and in planning future activities. It is the judgement of the trustees that activities in pursuit of the above objectives fully meet the public benefit test, which they have kept in mind in planning programmes for the charity.

#### Financial review

#### Restricted funds

The year was marked by the partial receipt of a legacy from the Du Broff estate. Out of a total bequest of some £474,000 an interim payment of £250,000 was received in December 2015. The balance which is subject to probate in the Isle of Man is anticipated to be received later this year.

The interim payment has initially been applied against the cost of refurbishment work referred to above. By the end of the financial year some £ 103,000 had been expended under this heading. A further sum of £5, 000 for consultancy work was also treated as exceptional expenditure. Of the balance of £142,000 it is proposed to invest a major portion in Charitable Fund Units on the stock market, which can be encashed on demand. In the meantime the Synagogue will benefit from a new income stream. All of these transactions fall under the heading of Restricted Funds which means that they are not part of funds available for the day to day running of the Synagogue. To that end they are kept in a separate bank account.

#### Unrestricted funds

Incoming resources, compared to the previous year were lower because of reduced donations and letting income giving a shortfall of £6,000 whilst Resources expended were £19, 900 higher.

These were due to payroll costs (+£7,700), Charity donations (+£6,100) and High Holy Day Costs (+£3300).

The combination of these and other factors led to a negative impact on Unrestricted Funds of some £10,900 for the year compared to a surplus of £16,000 in 2015.

Under this heading the Reserves of the Synagogue were maintained at a similar level to the previous year.

#### Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the charity's constitution. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# Independent examiner's report to the trustees on the unaudited financial statements of Ealing Liberal Synagogue.

I report on the accounts of Ealing Liberal Synagogue for the year ended 31 March 2016 which are set out on pages 2 to 14

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and independent examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The Charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed. # Notes to financial statements For the year ended 31 March 2016

## 1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year.

#### 1.1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention except for the freehold land and building which is included at the market value, and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice' Charities SORP (FRS102) effective 1st January 2015 and the Charities Act 2011. Realised and unrealised gains and losses are recognised in the period to which they relate.

#### 1.2. Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable except subscriptions and Gift Aid Tax claims, which are recognised on received basis. Grants where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Gifts donated for resale are included as incoming resources within activities for generating funds when they are sold.

Income from the charity shop is included in the year in which it is receivable.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

Legacies are included when the charity is advised by the personal representative of an estate that payment will be made or property transferred and the amount involved can be quantified.

#### 1.3. Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes including the charity's shop.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

## 1.4. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:
