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# Chairman's Report

This is the last time I will write a Chair's Report. As my term ends, it seems fitting to look back over the last four years as well as the year just gone by. The first thing that strikes me is the way the congregation has thrived, and continues to thrive, under Rabbi Janet; new arrivals, or people who visit, always make a point of saying how friendly and welcoming we are and we owe that, in large part, to her leadership. And while we have always been an outward looking community, I like to think we have become even more involved in local life over the past few years. We have joined London Citizens, regularly contribute to the Lambeth food bank, and have increasingly taken the lead in local Holocaust Memorial commemorations.

The second is that even though money has been tight, we have been able to continue to maintain and renew the building, and respond to emergencies. This year, as I'm sure we all remember only too well, the boilers failed; we now have a modern, energy-efficient replacement. We raised money to repair the Kolin scroll and as I write it is about to be taken off to the soferet for repair. The good times may still be just around the corner, and no one will sustain the synagogue if we do not do it, but I leave office more confident that South London Liberal Synagogue will celebrate a 90th or 100th anniversary than I was when I began.

The third is the number of people who give unstintingly of their time and energy to sustain the community. It can feel as if only two or three people run everything, but in fact, as individuals move on, others emerge to take their place. This Annual Report contains pieces from some of them, but there are many, many more. I have been lucky to be supported by a tremendous Council, but a special mention to William Cohen, our Treasurer, and Louise his wife, who put in a great deal of work, keep us solvent, to produce our accounts, and to ensure things like gift aid forms are in order. It's not glamorous but it is essential, and very hard work. Dan Kirk, the Secretary, and Philip Walker, in his role as subscription secretary, do similar unglamorous but essential stuff.

Jackie Ashton and her team of teachers and helpers keep religion school running, and Friends of the Religion School and parents support them – my thanks to Shai Wade for his FRS chairmanship and Harriet Neuberger for taking over; we have the choir to sing at special services and many service leaders, whom Janet has thanked, and all the stewards. Special thanks are due to Vince Daly who stepped up to lead the choir following Michele's departure and we thank him too for everything else he does to support the 'Janet-and-SLLS Team', especially as we know that he also has many responsibilities at KLS. Louise and Jeromé Freedman, our Past President, continue to contribute tremendously – for example, this Annual Report has been produced by Louise and (I bet) proof read by Jeromé. And every single one of the community has some time set up or put down tables, brought something for kiddush, or just taken the time to talk to someone who was looking a little lost.

And the last thing that strikes me is how much I have enjoyed getting to know people in the congregation better, and how satisfying it has been. I hope that the "refreshed" team of Council and officers find it as rewarding as I have done.

# Rabbi's Report the year in review

It was another busy year for SLLS, my fifth as your minister. It has been an exciting year on many fronts and thanks go to the many people who worked so hard to plan and support these events. I especially thank Council members and Chair Eve Samson, but also the many community members of various ages who have worked so hard at so many activities this year.

We are fortunate to have number of lay leaders who have taken services for us this year: Ba'alei Tefilah Beverley Taylor, Paul Ashton and Peter Phillips as well as Jeromé Freedman, Jane and Lara Hart, Philip Walker, and Simon and Lianna Etkind.

We welcomed a number of new members during the course of the year and held a special New Members' Shabbat. We also remembered those whom we have lost through a number of leaf dedication ceremonies this past year and a memorial service for Joan Rich. We welcomed several Rabbinic Students to our pulpit: Emily Jurman for Lech Lecha weekend, Haim Casas who spoke about the renewal of Jewish life in Spain, and Hannah Kingston.

We also had some special family services—the blessing of our animal companions (not in person) was a real highlight, and we held a special Kolin Scroll themed Family Service. And we had two special birthday kiddushim: for Beverley Taylor and for Simon Benedictus.

Our second year of Garden Shabbatot during the summer was as successful as the first and offers a great way to welcome Shabbat in the great outdoors. We held our second Pride Shabbat and we explored three different types of services (Movement, Contemplation and Chanting as well as a Learning Service) on our special Shabbat 3 Ways in August. We continued our exploration of Jewish Communities around the world on fifth Fridays, looking at the Baghdadi Jewish community, Jews In Cuba, in Spain and in France. These services offered a chance to learn about the history and current life of Jews in other communities.

With many of the festivals falling on Sundays, we were lucky to have many opportunities to celebrate with our families. Sukkot decorating, Simchat Torah and Purim were all well attended and joyous celebrations. We held our annual Tu B'sh'vat Seder, our second night Communal Seder for Pesach and a Shavuot seder as well as regular festival services.

We celebrated as our young people came of age: Zach Ashton, Elinor Haylor and Samuel Cohen all became B'nai Mitzvah. Caleb Brohiri, Matthew Feuer and Annie Watson prepared and led a wonderful Kabbalat Torah service.

We have moved more fully into the digital media age with an active Facebook page which included daily thoughts from the beginning if Elul through Yom Kippur and again daily thoughts during the Omer period.

We also were involved with our neighbours. This was the 4<sup>th</sup> year of our HMD education project with Dunraven School. We held an "Open Service" during Sukkot, to which we welcomed our neighbours and we hosted a photography exhibit focussed on asylum seekers. We have continued to be involved with London Citizens, expanding the Streatham CitySafe Zone, working for a "Living Wage" and participating with Faiths Together in Lambeth.

The last year has been exceptionally busy for Religion School. The children followed the Liberal
Judaism curriculum looking at the heroes and heroines of the Torah before enjoying a term focusing on
Israel culminating in a very successful 'Israel Experience Day' where the children had the opportunity to
encounter different aspects of Israel. This included the opportunity to visit an Israeli café and try out
their Hebrew, taking part in a mock archaeological dig and a guided bus tour of famous sights. We
also had the opportunity to investigate the Jewish East End during a fascinating tour led by Philip

Walker. None of this would have been possible without the hard work and enthusiasm of our dedicated teachers and assistants.

Little Stars toddler group has enjoyed another successful year exploring Jewish life through crafts and songs, and joining with the rest of Religion School for the Israel Experience Day where the children displayed their own version of the Kotel.

We joined with the community to celebrate the festivals. Highlights included families helping to create decorations to adorn the Sukkah, and the unrolling of a whole scroll around the Synagogue at Simchat Torah.

It has also been a year of changes. Harriet Neuberger, after several years of teaching, has moved on to lead our Friends of Religion School. Ben Ish-Horowicz, having spent two years inspiring Kitah Aleph, left to spend time travelling before starting university. Both were greatly missed by their classes.

We also said good-bye to Rosalyn Brandon who stepped down as administrator after many years association with Religion School. Ros had been involved for many years, initially with the Friends of Religions School, before becoming our very resourceful and capable administrator. We had the opportunity to thank Ros and wish her well at a celebratory Family Service which was attended by parents, children, family and friends.

The religion school is an important part of our community; it is where our youngest members meet and learn, and also provides an opportunity for parents to meet each other and other members. The Friends of Religion School also gives parents of religion school students and members of the synagogue who want to get involved in the education of our youngest members, a chance to meet and contribute. We aim to celebrate the synagogue not only as a house of learning and a house of prayer but also as a house of meeting. We have a coffee morning planned for early in the September term and are planning a special kiddush to celebrate the kabbalat torah students and contribute to the Chanukkah spirit on 30th November. # **Adult Education** Rabbi Janet Darley

Rehearsals are well under way and the Choir is planning to sing throughout the High Holydays, accompanied once again by organist Barry Eaton. Council's Report

Registered Charity No 236711

The Council presents its report together with the Financial Statements of the Synagogue for the year ended 31 August 2013. These Financial Statements are not statutorily required to be audited and have been independently examined by Ūna Nī Dhōnaill, whose report appears below.

# Origin, objectives and principal aims and activities of the charity

The Synagogue was formed in 1929 and has the following purpose:

to advance Liberal Judaism by teaching and practice, in particular by means of:

- (a) providing religious education for children and adults and providing facilities and teaching leading to *Bar Mitzvah* or *Bat Mitzvah* and *Kabbalat Torah* (Confirmation);
- (b) providing and maintaining a place for public religious worship and providing, arranging and conducting religious services;
- (c) providing facilities for the solemnisation of marriages and for burials and cremations.

#### Council

# **Review of the activities**

# **Reserves policy**

The Charity's principal activities are detailed above.

1. The present reserve level is considered realistic in order to maintain liquid reserves to cover the Synagogue's day to day activities.

2. At each annual Budget meeting, a review of the current level of reserves will be undertaken against Budget predictions.

At 31 August 2013 Unrestricted Funds amounted to £143,905 (2012: £148,709). Total funds stood at £184,950 (2012: £187,819).

# Risk management

Council has decided not to prepare a formal risk review report. However, it will continue to review areas of potential risk. The principal financial risks identified in the short to medium term are as follows:

- The possible need for further repairs to the Synagogue building,
- Inflation, which is not easily offset by increased subscriptions,
- A continuing imbalance between income and expenditure.

# Statement of Council's responsibilities

Company law requires the Council to prepare Financial Statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those Financial Statements, Council is required to:

- (i) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- (ii) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- (iii) prepare the Financial Statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

Council is responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Synagogue. It is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Synagogue and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Synagogue Council

I report on the accounts of the South London Liberal Synagogue for the year ended 31 August 2013, which are set out on pages 10 - 12.

### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 43(2) of the Charities Act 1993 (the 1993 Act)) and that an independent examination is needed.

# It is my responsibility to

examine the accounts (under Section 43(3)(a) of the 1993 Act), to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners (under Section 43(7)(b) of the 1993 Act) and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

# Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

# Independent examiner's statement

It is a movement with a sense of purpose, engaged in community life, study, spirituality and social action. It believes in personal freedom and responsibility and the shared and collective bonds that unite us as Jewish people and members of humanity. Liberal Judaism welcomes those who grew up as Jewish and those who, later in life, have become accepted into Judaism. Liberal Judaism is inclusive and egalitarian, giving equal status within Judaism to those traditionally excluded, helping all its members to embark on their personal Jewish journeys. Liberal Judaism should be a positive, joyous and active part of our members' lives, to be used www.liberaljudaism.org/ to enrich their relationships with those around them.

The World Union for Progressive Judaism's over 1,200 congregations around the world – both large and small, some established and others just starting – currently affiliate with Reform, Progressive, Liberal or Reconstructionist Judaism. With an estimated 1.8 million members in 45 countries, the liberal streams of Judaism represent a global community with diverse practices but a similar goal: a contemporary, creative expression of Jewish spiritual and cultural identity that is rooted in our rich Jewish traditions.



The European Union of the World Union, based in London, focuses particularly on the challenges of continental Europe where the increasing Jewish population now provides enormous potential for growth. Communities destroyed during the Nazi period are re-emerging and rebuilding themselves from both survivors who returned after the Second World War and immigrants from the Former Soviet Union, many of whom are settling in Germany where there are now 18 congregations and many education programs. Two rabbinical seminaries, in Germany and the Netherlands, are complementing the work of the Leo Baeck College in the UK in training rabbis for Europe.

Outside the United Kingdom there are substantial congregations in Austria, Belgium, France, Germany, the Netherlands and Switzerland, as well as smaller ones in the Czech Republic, Denmark, Hungary, Italy, Luxembourg, Poland, Spain and Sweden. A well-organized European Union Beit Din provides a coherent structure for emerging communities and offers a modus vivendi for individuals and for new groups living under difficult circumstances particularly in former Communist countries. www.eupj.org/

Leo Baeck College is unique - providing information, education and Rabbinic training for Judaism in the 21st century as well as offering educational consultancy, development of community leaders, providing access to Jewish learning for all and working with those of other religions to advance understanding and respect.



The college library, second to none, is a resource not only for its students, but for the whole community. Reader's tickets are available to those interested. Its resource centre is well-stocked with teaching resources to support RS teachers.

With the appointment of Rabbi Dr Deborah Kahn-Harris as its Principal and its redesign of its Rabbinic Curriculum, LBC is well-placed to continue its leadership role in the 21st Century. www.lbc.ac.uk/

# **Board of Deputies of British Jews** Jeromé Freedman

The freedoms enjoyed by the Jewish community today can be seen in the number of communal institutions, schools, places of worship and facilities available to young and old, the majority of which operate as charities. The Board monitors and responds to policy and legislative changes to ensure that there is a political and legal framework conducive to the ability of those organizations to provide services freely and efficiently to our community. This includes cultivating close working relationships with civil servants and politicians, the Charity Commission and other relevant agencies to understand and respond to changes in Charity Law and Equalities Legislation.

On occasion, direct or indirect challenges to our Jewish way of life arise and, whether intentional or as the unintended consequence of other developments, the Board must be ready to respond by lobbying and representing the community's concerns at the very highest level in government, in the European Union or in the United Nations.

Congregations elect Deputies every three years and I have represented SLLS since 2003 and Liberal Judaism for six years prior to that. I have served as a member of the Constitution Committee for the past 13 years and as its chairman during the last triennial session with a seat at meetings of the Executive Committee. The Board holds eight full meetings in every calendar year and any member of SLLS may attend having given due notice. Indeed, any member aged under 35 may currently be appointed as an "Under-35 Designated Observer" and with no increase in the annual Representation Fee.

# Chaplaincy

We are located in an area with a number of hospitals. We are officially represented by Peter Phillips as part of the interfaith chaplaincy team at Kings. Besides visiting Jewish patients, he conducted a Chanukkah candlelighting. We have recently come to a similar chaplaincy agreement with Guys and St Thomas's.

#### **London Citizens** Lianna Etkind

This year, SLLS has worked with South London Citizens on several issues, including Living Wage, safety on the streets and pay day loan shops. We held a CitySafe walk on Streatham High Street, asking shops to sign up to become City Safe Havens. Several members participated in the South London Citizens Assembly in Croydon last year, meeting other South London institutions and hearing what other borough chapters had been up to. In January, SLLS hosted people from all over London for the London Citizens two day leadership training and, in the summer, members participated in an action calling for the new Nine Elms development to be a Living Wage zone with new jobs going to local people. I also attended an action in Whitehall for cleaners in government departments to receive the Living Wage. Rabbi Janet met with police about safety in the borough and was part of a delegation to Leader of the Lambeth Council, Lib Peck, requesting action against Pay Day Loan shops.

# **Interfaith and Community Activities** Rabbi Janet Darley

We remain involved with LAMAG. With Cedric stepping down from its board during the year, we are pleased that Karen Briscoe has stepped up and joined the LAMAG team.

As a community we have hosted and joined with Faiths Together in Lambeth in a number of ways over the year.

For the third year I spoke at an Iftar at Hyderi Mosque. Several SLLS members also attended and we are always warmly welcomed there. We hosted a group of Anglican trainees at a Shabbat Service and last November we participated in an Interfaith Event in Tooting. In July we held a Jewish Music Concert in connection with the Streatham Festival which was a very successful event.

# **Lambeth Holocaust Memorial Day and Education Project**

We were actively involved in planning the Lambeth HMD ceremony in January, We also again hosted and were key in delivering the Holocaust Education project with Dunraven School, in its fourth year,

expanded to host 150 pupils in two sessions. This project welcomes pupils to watch a film about German rescuers, hear testimony of someone who is a survivor, a hidden child or came on the Kindertransport. This is followed by break-out sessions with trained facilitators in which pupils engage in activities allowing them to process what they have heard, engage with the year's theme and think about the danger signs to watch out for which can lead a society down the path to genocide as well as to think about how they can act to prevent victimization even in small ways. The session concludes with the year's HMD film and with a candle-lighting service. Peter Phillips was the anchor person for the day's events. A number of our members trained as facilitators for this project: Jeromé and Louise Freedman, Philip and Gill Walker, and Lara Hart. We were also joined by David Wirth from Leigham Court Road and Barbara Wilson, who is a co-chair of Lambeth Citizens.

# Jewish Walks and more Philip Walker

My fascination with Jewish history has continued unabated over the last 12 months, and members will have noticed my ongoing display of late C19th and early C20th Jewish photographs in the Lily Montagu Hall, which remain on loan from the Jewish East End Celebration Society. Coupled with this are two Jewish East End walks I have led on behalf of SLLS – the first being a walk around the amazing Sephardic cemeteries of Mile End and the second being a walk around Jewish Spitalfields with students of the Leo Baeck college as part of their history course. I hope others may come to share my enthusiasm as our Jewish story has so much to teach us and is something of which we can be immensely proud.

#### **School visits**

This year more than 20 schools have visited the synagogue with a number of volunteers hosting the visits (Jeromé, Lara, Louise, Philip and Rabbi Janet). The group sizes have tended to be between 30-90 children at a time, ages ranged from Year 2 to Year 7. The total number of children coming to the synagogue over the year is still close to 1000 (despite several visits having to be recheduled because of work to replace our boiler and thanks are due to our administrator, Josephine Farr, for coping so ably with the extra work involved.). Lara's two-part system for the older children continues to be used so that they also get a chance to view the photo display of East End Jewish life in the Lily Montagu Hall. There have also been several visits out to schools by Rabbi Janet, Lara and others. If you are able to spare some time to show a school party round, please get in touch with the SLLS office.

The Synagogue facilities are available for hire for private functions at competitive rates and the Lily Montagu Hall can seat up to 100 people.
