COMMEMORATING ONE

ONI HUNDRED VEARS AGO — on 24th September 1856 — the Synagogue at Singers Hill, Birningham, was consecrated by the Chief Rabbi, the Very Rev. Dr. Nathan Adler, who in the course of his address described it as "an honour to the architect, a glory to the Community and an aromanent to the tewn.'

HUNDRED YEARS . . .

Since then, the prestige of the Birmingham Hebrew Congregation has been enhanced by its characteristic unity. It has grown considerably in numbers and in influence, so that today it is still not only the primary congregation of Birmingham Jewry, but one of the leading congregations in Angle-Jewry.

In commemoration of this historic anniversary, a special Centenary service will be held in the Synarogate on Sunday, 14th October, 1956, at which the Chief Rabbi, the Very Rev. Israel Broole, will officiate. On the same evening, a Celebration Banquer will be held at the Grand Hotel, Birmingham, Fuller details of these events will be circulated among the members of the congregation in due corrae.

THE COMMUNAL HALL

It is proposed to convert the present kichen and Succah alongide the Main Hall into a lounge with direct approach from an improved entrance lobby ; the existing duramy windows will be oppende up to give several direct approaches to the main floor. This will considerably improve the accommodation and amenities of the Communal Hall.

To erect over the present kitchen and Succah :

- (a) A large modern kitchen with direct access from Ellis Street, having lifts to a servery on the ground floor adjoining the new lounge. The need for bigger and better kitchen facilities has been a matter of concern to users for many years.
- (b) New secretarial offices and an ante-room to the Council Chamber. Both these improvements are very desirable.
- (c) To transfer the Succah to the space between the Communal Hall (stage end) and the rear of the Synagogue.

Generally

- (a) In order to enhance the beauty of the Synagogue, it is proposed to replace all the plain windows with highly artistic stained glass. (Details and designs are set out in this brochure).
- (b) It is proposed to alter the central section of the Choir Gallery, thereby improving the view of the Ark and the stained glass window over.
- (c) It is intended to modernise the Heating Plant by the introduction of oil burning equipment and the renewal of boilers.
- (d) The Congregation's superannuation scheme is to be brought into line with modern requirements and placed on a firmer basis.
- (e) A History of the Congregation over the past 100 years is being compiled and written by Mr, Harry Levine, A synopsis of the History in brochure form, suitably illustrated, will be printed and a copy presented to every member of the Construction.
- (f) Medallions commemorating the centenary will be distributed among the children of the Congregation.

W1TH these stirring words our Chief Minister, Rev. Chaim Pearl, ended his historic pronouncement on the first day of Rosh Hashanah 1955, when he outlined a scheme to commemorate the Centenary Year 1956.

Although economic conditions have compelled us to modify our more ambitious projects, the principle underlying our aim remains, namely that of commemorating our centenary in a practical way, by modernising and extending the facilities available for our religious and communal life.

£50,000 SYNAGOGUE CENTENARY APPEAL

To cover the cost of the various schemes outlined above, it is estimated that a sum of £50,000 is required, exclusive of the new stained glass windows.

Many years have passed since our Congregation was last asked to provide a substantial sum for local needs. Hence it is with every confidence that we now launch our SYNAGOGUE CENTENARY APPEAL.
