### Report of the trustee

### For the year ended 31 March 2014

The trustee presents his report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2014. The Charity has been given a dispensation by the charity commission from publishing the names of its trustees.

#### Structure, governance and management

Ealing Liberal Synagogue (ELS) is governed by its Constitution & Rules as approved at an AGM on 5 June 2011. It property and affairs are under the government and control of a Council. The Council consists of a President, 2 Vice Presidents, ex officio the Minister (Rabbi), the Chair and 9 ordinary members. The Council has the power to appoint the Minister and other employees notably the Administrator. The Council appoints 3 Holding Trustees. ELS is affiliated to Liberal Judaism.

#### **Objectives**

In summary these are:

- a) The advancement of Liberal Judaism;
- b) Provision of religious services;
- c) Provision of place of worship;
- d) Provision of services and classes for children;
- e) Arranging for burial and cremation of members;
- f) Enabling solemnisation of marriages;
- g) Performing other religious, communal, charitable duties including a Memorial Welfare Fund;
- h) Carrying out other things conducive to the above.

#### Achievements and performance

#### Membership

The increase in membership is encouraging in particular as this is despite 5 members leaving and 2 deceased. It has come about, among other things, by the activities of a Membership committee including a stall at the Bedford Park Festival and a tea for new members. The relatively high age profile of our membership makes it essential that this increase is maintained in future years. An initiative by Citizens UK (who are already working for Liberal Judaism) to develop and strengthen relationships within our community is being explored which may lead to future growth. 3 bar/bat mitzvahs and 2 weddings were celebrated.

#### Services

These were held on all Friday evenings and once a month on Saturdays. Once a month the Rabbi prepared a 'Tisch' (supper) for members on Friday evening in lieu of a formal service. The High Holydays Rosh Hashanah (Jewish New Year) and Yom Kippur (Day of Atonement) in autumn 2013 attracted a large congregation of members and others from outside.

# Report of the trustee For the year ended 31 March 2014

#### Religion School

The ELS Religion School (cheder) provided Hebrew and Jewish studies tuition from reception age until approximately School Year 8. The Rabbi functioned as the Headteacher, selecting our curriculum materials and teaching the b'nei mitzvah class. She was supported by one other adult member of staff. The remainder of the staff were drawn from our post b'nei mitzvah students. In both 2012/13 and 2013/14 there were three teenage staffers and an additional teaching assistant joined in the autumn of 2013.

Another member offered additional support for Hebrew tuition as her schedule allowed.

Our goal was to ensure that every child in the cheder (who wished to do so) was enabled to mark a bar or bat mitzvah as the culmination of this early stage of their Jewish education. This usually required some outside Hebrew tuition, but in two recent cases, this task was undertaken by a committed parent.

We encouraged all students to participate in Liberal Judaism's youth movement, LJY Netzer, as one of the most important factors in maintaining a strong Jewish identity is contact with enthusiastic Jewish peers. Involvement with LJY is particularly important for our teenagers, as our small size precluded running a Kabbalat Torah (post b'nei mitzvah) class. A film by the cheder won second place in Liberal Judaism's 'LAFTA' awards.

The number of children enrolled in the Religion School in 2012/13 was 18. We ended the 2013/14 academic year with 20 pupils.

#### 70th Anniversary

ELS celebrated the 70th Anniversary of its founding with a special service (attended by the Liberal Judaism Chief Executive and local dignitaries and faith representatives) on 29 June 2013. This was followed by events showing the range of social and cultural activities we offer.

### Social/Welfare

Regular activities included a coffee morning, book club, bridge, badminton and Israeli dancing and 'In the Chair' talks. Annual events taking place were a barbecue at a member's home and a Quiz Supper. A 'chanukah' tea was held for elderly members and hospital and home visits made. We have a scheme for regular telephone contacts with members who wish this. The annual charity evening to collect for outside charities was held in summer.

### **ELS Premises**

In spring 2013 in the light of previous and expected future financial deficits due to falling membership and heavy expenditure to maintain our old building in a safe condition, a proposal was made to sell the existing building and move to rented accommodation in the local Quaker building near Ealing Broadway. This proposal was narrowly defeated by Council. Following this decision to stay the use of our building was reviewed to make it more attractive to groups wanting to hire space. A decision has been made to redevelop the sanctuary replacing the pews with chairs which is to be carried out in summer 2015.

### Maintenance/Health & Safety/Security

The synagogue hall and committee rooms were redecorated in preparation for the 70th anniversary. Following a legal threat from a neighbour and to avoid future expenditure on regular tree surgery, the leylandii trees on our boundaries were cut down. Our open front ranch fencing was consequently replaced by regular spaced fencing. An asbestos survey was carried out confirming our main roof was in a stable condition. A fire and general risk assessment was carried out by outside consultants and their recommendations are under consideration. The annual gas safety, fire extinguisher and portable electrical equipment checks were carried out. A new dish washer and fridge/freezer were installed. The enormous contribution of our Maintenance Officer to our major maintenance both financially and in providing skilled contractors is acknowledged with gratitude. An ELS friend took on the role of Security Officer for ELS and arranged the security rota for the High Holy Days. Our thanks go to him and our Administrator and the religion school parents for their role in security.

### Report of the trustee For the year ended 31 March 2014

#### Lettings

Our letting to a nursery school during school terms continues and a rent increase and restructuring to separate out a payment for utilities were negotiated in addition to a contribution to the redecoration for our anniversary. Rent increases from existing tenants (Slimnastics, Karate) were obtained and a new letting obtained (Yoga). The outside bridge club left us not wanting to pay the rent increase. New lettings are being sought.

#### Administration/Communication

Much has been done to tidy up the membership lists and collect subscriptions. Collection of letting income by standing order rather than cash has increased. A scheme ("Easy Fundraising") for ELS to obtain a small percentage from suppliers to members (at no cost to them) of goods and services on the internet has been introduced. A member has kindly taken on the submission of our Gift Aid claim to HMRC. A letter has sent to members encouraging them to remember ELS in their wills. Minor maintenance, cleaning, printing, postage and keeping keeping of the bank statements have been ably handled by our Administration. We publish a bimonthly magazine Shalom and a monthly ebulletin. A banner, designed by a member's company, advertising our building to potential hirers has been erected. Our thanks go to our very able Administrator.

#### Liberal Judaism

ELS is affiliated to Liberal Judaism (LJ) which has 35 communities in the UK and Eire. Members attended LJ seminars on outreach and fundraising and the LJ Day of Celebration in Birmingham. A summer seminar at Leo Baeck College for training progressive rabbis was attended.

#### Interfaith

Church and other faith groups visited the synagogue and a one of our members is on the UK Interfaith Network.

#### Financial review

The negative funds flow for 2013/14 was due in large part to heavy repairs and maintenance expenditure of £16,621 on our premises including the redecoration £4400, tree felling £4848, new dishwasher £1680 and the exterior fence £2500. As mentioned this expenditure would have been much higher had it not been for the generosity of our Maintenance Officer. Further major building expenditure will be incurred in 2014/15 due to repair to our flat roof which was badly leaking and to a fire alarm system and emergency lighting.

In 2013/14 members subscriptions increased by about £2000 over 2012/13. We remained heavily dependent on outside lettings which brought in over £15000 in 2013/14.

Although reserves of 3 months income are commonly kept by charities Council agreed in January 2014 that, in view if the age of our building, ELS should keep reserves of £40,000 equivalent to 5 around months income. This figure is to be maintained in real terms using a cost of repair and maintenance index in future years. This requirement was more than met as at 31 March 2014 with investments of £39,107 and cash at bank and in hand of £39,033.

### Report of the trustee For the year ended 31 March 2014

#### Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that year. In preparing these financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping sufficient accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. They also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# Notes to financial statements For the year ended 31 March 2014

#### 1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding period.

#### 1.1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention except for the freehold land and building which is included at the market value, and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Charities Act 1993. Realised and unrealised gains and losses are recognised in the period to which they relate.

### 1.2. Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable except subscriptions and Gift Aid Tax claims, which are recognised on received basis. Grants where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Gifts donated for resale are included as incoming resources within activities for generating funds when they are sold.

Income from the charity shop is included in the year in which it is receivable.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

### 1.3. Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes including the charity's shop.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### 1.4. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Land and buildings - Nil

Fixtures, fittings and equipment - 20% reducing balance basis
